War News.

**Messages Received
Previous to 9 A.M.**

NO SLACKENING OF BLOCKADE.

LONDON, June 16.
As the result of the discussion
the blockade at the recent Allied Con-
vention in Paris, conclusions were
reached which will remove many mis-
conceptions at present existing among
neutrals, according to Lord Robert
Ceil, Minister of War Trade, who at-
tended the conference as British re-
presentative. What these conclusions
were, Lord Robert would not state,
but he asserted that the blockade
would work better as the result of
the conference. Asked if there
would be a tightening of the blockade,
Lord Robert paused, and then replied
with a laugh, "there will be no slack-
ening." Further than that he would
not commit himself. He said the
main object of his going to Paris was
to make sure that the Allies should
agree absolutely on policy. There
was a little to be done to achieve this,
he declared, and both governments,
British and French, were completely
agreed as to what should be done.
The conclusions reached, he added,
would not cause any change of meth-
od in the blockade, but would make
the stand of the Allies a stronger one,
through the removal of misconcep-
tions. Lord Robert reiterated that
the Allies did not wish to interfere
with neutral trade except such as was
for the benefit of hostile countries.

FRENCH HOLD SECRET SESSION.

PARIS, June 16.
For the first time during the course
of the war, the Chamber of Deputies
this afternoon went into secret session
after a vote for holding such sit-
tings had been passed by 412 to 138.
The purpose of the secret session was
for the discussion of interpellations
concerning the conduct of the war,
particularly of the defensive meas-

ures taken at the beginning of the
Verdun battle.

**BOARD OF TRADE APPOINTS COM-
MITTEE.**

LONDON, June 16.
The Board of Trade has appointed
a committee headed by Sir John Mac-
kinnon Robertson, to include other
members of the Commons and Econ-
omists, in order to investigate the
rise in prices of commodities, and to
recommend remedial measures.

**BRITISH WARSHIPS BOMBARD
KLEMA SKROFO.**

NEW YORK, June 16.
A despatch from Athens to-day to
the New York Journal, says that the
Greek army is being transferred to
Voia, as the result of the establish-
ment of martial law at Salonika.
British warships have bombarded
Klema Skrofo, in Asia Minor. The
Turks, fearing an attempt would be
made to force a landing, rushed
troops from Smyrna.

**GERMANS BOMBARD ALLIES' POSI-
TIONS.**

NEW YORK, June 16.
A News Agency despatch from Sal-
onika to-day, says that the German
bombardment of the Allies' position
between Lake Arznanand and Kalin-
der is officially announced. Artillery
shelled the position, 200 projectiles
of large calibre being fired at one
point.

TRANSFERRED TO VOLO.

PARIS, June 16.
It is reported from Salonika that a
Havas despatch from Athens to-day
says that in consequence of the es-
tablishment of martial law by the
allies in that district and the taking
over by them of the postal, telegraph,
railway and customs administration
of the Greek military bases, as well
as the troops occupying the forts
around them, have been transferred
to Volo on the coast of Thessaly
about 100 miles northwest of Athens.

IN EAST AFRICA.

LONDON, June 16.
British forces operating in the
eastern part of German East Africa,

made further advances, occupying the
village of Kilimanjaro and another
village nearby. A large German force
is confronting the British in this sec-
tor. Further south, near the coast,
the British have occupied the impor-
tant post of Karogow, and in the
northwest have seized positions in
the Victoria Nyanza sector. These
announcements are made in an of-
ficial statement issued to-night as
follows: Kwedizwa, six miles north
of Handeni has been occupied, also
the village of Kilimanjaro, close to
Handeni. A large German force is
entrenched near the Handeni water
supply. The important station of
Karogow and a wagon bridge over
the Bangani River have been secured
by the British. The island of Ukere-
we, north of the German post of Man-
usa, on Lake Victoria, has been oc-
cupied. Two Krupp guns and stores
were taken.

IN MESOPOTAMIA.

LONDON, June 16.
The Official Press Bureau to-day
gave out a statement dealing with op-
erations in Mesopotamia, as follows:
On the north bank of the Tigris, east
of Kut-el-Amara, our trenches have
been pushed within 200 yards of the
Turks at Sannayat. On the south
bank, Manasra has been occupied.
This place is three miles south of
Mayasra. A successful punitive ex-
pedition has been made against the
Arabs who persistently cut the tele-
graphs north of Hamar Lake. Two
hundred cart loads of grain and some
sheep were taken from the raids on
hostile Arab tribes. Three of our
Tigris barges were sunk by Turkish
artillery on June 10. The imagina-
tive Turkish communique of Thurs-
day was founded on the above.

ITALIAN STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, June 16.
The Italian steamer Mattia, 500 tons
gross, has been sunk, a Lloyd's an-
nouncement to-day states.

**Sick Ward at
Curling Rink**



The card and refresh-
ment rooms at the Curl-
ing Rink have been con-
verted into a temporary
hospital, for the use of the volunteers
now in training who at any time may
become ill. Some twenty cots, well
provided with clean linen and blank-
ets of Red Cross size and quality have
been installed, which a few of the
boys occupied yesterday. A dispens-
ary containing large supplies of
medicines, similar to those used in
hospitals is situated just off the
ward. Private C. Keste of the Am-
bulance staff, is in charge of the
patients who are daily visited by Dr.
Paterson. Mr. W. Reeves, who has at
all times shown a deep interest in the
soldiers, and who for many years was
associated with ambulance work,
sleeps each night at the sick ward in
case his services should be needed.

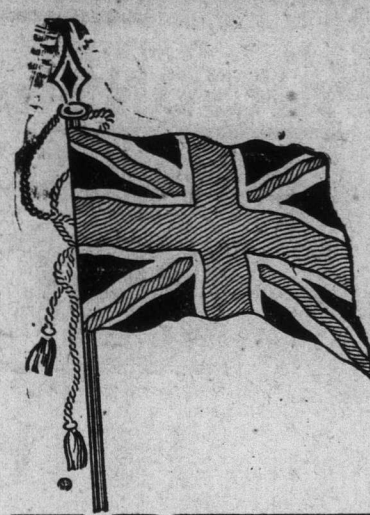
