

THE SERBIAN SUCCESSES.



It is interesting to observe how opinion has veered around in the course of a year with regard to the Salonika expedition, and changed from open denunciation or veiled scepticism to unanimous approval. Whether M. Briand is to be credited with the idea or not, it was a remarkable foresight which dictated the posting of the large army at this spot at a time when it could do no more than offer a refuge to the fleeing remnants of the little Serbian army. Yet the effect of the Allies' hold upon this port and base, backed up by the might of their navies, has been, and will continue to be, tremendously important. Among the little advantages it has obtained for us is the co-operation of Roumania which we should certainly. tained for us is the co-operation of Roumania, which we should certainly not have got but for it and the great army based upon it.

The victory of the Serbians seems to have been considerable. At one point they have got across the Tcherna, and as they are still fighting the Bulgarians at Kaymakchalan, which is well east of that river, it is probable that, as the message states, they have turn-ed part of the Bulgarian line and got ed part of the Bulgarian line and got behind it. This advantage, vigorously followed up, should have a great effect. With the railway station of Kenali in their hands and the Tcherna successfully crossed, the most serious natural obstacles in the way to Monastir would seem to be passed. Meantime, it will be well to keep an eye on the doings of the Italians in Albania, where they are said to be in great force and have already advanced a long way towards Serbia. The Macedonia drama is under way and the first scene will have for its subject the battle for Monastir. Upon the issue of that battle much of the subsequent plot will depend.

President Wilson has, as usual, avoided the plain issue and makes a great fuss about ascertaining whether or not Germany has established submarine bases on the American coast, which is quite another matter. 
