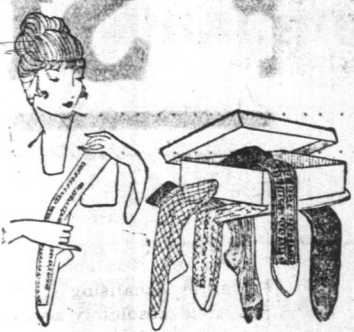

Legislative Council.

May 27.

The House opened at 4 p.m. The Bill entitled "An Act to amend the Judicature Act," and an "Act to provide for the Standardisation of Codfish," passed the third reading.

The Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 172 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (third series) entitled 'Of the Survey of Foreign-going and Labrador Vessels,'" passed the committee stage with some amendments.

The Bill entitled "An Act to provide for the better obtaining of Information respecting the Codfishery," passed the committee without further amendment.

On a division of the House three members voted for amendment i.e., to have the words "and qualities" stricken out.

Hon. John Anderson spoke on the Bill saying that he understood that a number of the fish merchants did not agree with the measure, but he was of the opinion that the majority thought the bill a good one and worthy of trial.

Hon. S. Milley, speaking on Section 5 of the Bill said he interviewed a number of fish exporters this morning and every one of them would like to see the words "and qualities" stricken out. It is a very small matter to have the words stricken out.

Hon. M. P. Gibbs spoke at length on the bill and urged its adoption.

The Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 176 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (third series) entitled 'Of the Encouragement of Shipbuilding,'" passed the committee stage with some amendments, and the Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 183 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series) entitled 'Of the Management and Control of the Harbor of Grand Bank,'" passed without amendment.

The Bills entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 4 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (third series) entitled 'Of Legislative Disabilities and the Vacation of Seats in the House of Assembly,'" "An Act to Provide for the Lighting of Outport Streets," "An Act to amend Chapter 88 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (third series) entitled 'Of Stipendiary Magistrates and Justices of the Peace,'" second reading of Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 27 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (third series) entitled 'Of Death Duties,'" passed the second reading.

A Bill entitled "An Act Concerning the Registration of Midwives," passed the second reading. Hon. Dr. Campbell stating he wished to move an amendment when the bill goes to committee. As it is an important bill he would go into the details at that time.

The Bills entitled "An Act for the Confirmation of a Contract with the Sisu Shipping Company, Limited," and "An Act to amend Chapter 137 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (third series) entitled 'Of the Fire Patrol,'" reached the committee stage.

The War Tax Act and the Profiteering Act were read a first time. The House adjourned at 6 p.m. till this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

In connection with the work of occupational training for our returned veterans in the various city hospitals, an advisory committee has been appointed to confer with Miss Evelyn Smith, who is now here from the Soldiers' Training Dept. at Ottawa. Burke, Mrs. Herbert Outerbridge and Mrs. Frank Bradshaw, with the Misses Mary Doyle, Laura Roper, Susie F. Taylor, Winnie Barker, Hettie Willis and Anna Ledingham as voluntary aids who are prepared to undertake the work of assisting the men under the direction of Miss Smith.

"Stick a Pin Here."

On this day, May 28th, 1835 (Notable Events) Robert J. Parsons, Editor of the newspaper Patriot, was sentenced by Judge Boulton to three months' imprisonment in the common jail, or pay a fine of fifty pounds to the King, for refusing to disclose the author of the following letter signed "Stick a Pin Here," which was published in the Patriot, on May 17:

"We understand that a lecture was delivered in the Court House yesterday, to the Grand and Petit Juries on the opening of the Central Circuit Court by the President of the Council in his capacity of Chief Judge, on the very great benefits which hanging the people confers on society, arising no doubt, from its sedative effects upon the human system, which, to the uninitiated are truly astonishing. The same excellent plan is to be followed up, in order to quell the fiery spirits, which at this moment, keep up a wholesale ripple on the surface of society, which, it would appear, fearfully disturbs the repose of the honorable lecturer and all other despots who shall dare to subvert the charters of the land,

and plant in their stead the unalloyed principles of arbitrary sway. Go it, ye cripples!"

This letter was thought to reflect upon the judicial honesty of Judge Boulton. The fine was promptly subscribed by the political admirers of the editor, and Mr. Parsons was released after being in prison but a few days.
