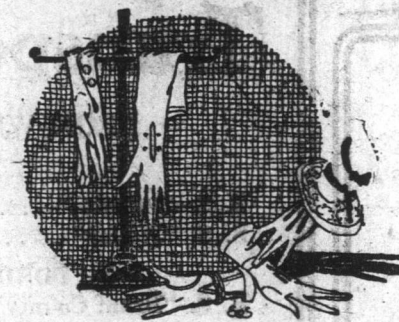

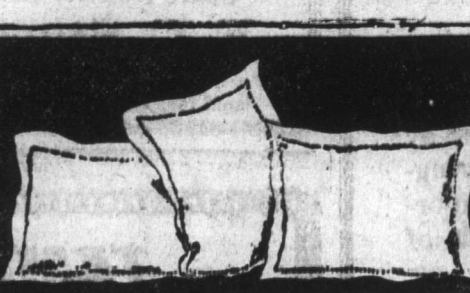

DIES IN MONTREAL.

Mary Ann Hackett, who was one hundred years of age, died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Robert Mathias, 422 St. Antoine Street, Montreal. Mrs. Hackett died in the bed to which she had been confined for several years. She had been a resident of Montreal for about fifteen years, having lived the greater part of her life in St. John's, Nfld., in which city she was born. In spite of her advanced age her mental faculties were active to the last, and she died without suffering. She is survived by three sons and one daughter, besides many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.—Montreal Star.

The deceased lady was well and favorably known in St. John's, being the widow of the late Mr. James Hackett, who lived on Bond Street (formerly Darling Street) for many years, and was a man who possessed a fund of valuable information, a most relatable memory, in fact, he was an encyclopedia of local events and happenings, not alone from his own experience and knowledge, but traditions and local history handed down from his ancestors. He died about 20 years ago, aged 84 years. Mrs. Hackett was a most estimable lady, and was ever ready to extend a helping hand to the poor and needy. Her family were noted for their longevity, her mother (Mrs. Murphy) having attained the patriarchal age of 101 years. Her son, Lawrence, was one of the crew of the steamship "Algonquin," Capt. Bartlett, which was lost with all hands on a passage from Philadelphia to this port, coal laden, about 23 years ago.
