POLL TAX.

The attention of the public is called to the following Sections of the St. John's Municipal Act,

Section 249: Every male person of the age of twenty-one years or upwards who has resided in the city for the period of twelve months immediately of twelve months immediately preceding the first day of Octo ber in any year, and who is not liable as owner or indirectly as tenant to the payment, of the City Tax on any property rated in the appraisement book of the Council at an annual rental value of forty dollars or upwards daily to any part of city. shall pay to the City a Poll Tax

Section 250: The said poll tax shall be due and payable without demand or notice by or from the Council between the fifteenth day of october and the fifteenth day of November in every year

at the office of the City Clerk. Section 251: Any person who fails to comply with the provisions of the foregoing section shall, in addition to payment of the tax be liable to a penalty not exceeding five dollars, or in default of payment to imprison ment not exceeding ten days.

All persons liable are hereby notified to govern themselves ac-
