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### A Wonderful Lake in Which Bathers Cannot Sink

Think of being able to bathe and swim at will in water in which it is absolutely impossible for a person to sink. Sounds almost like magic, doesn't it? But there really is a place where those who are fond of bathing—but who have never learned to swim—many venture out into the deepest water without the slightest danger.

This place is Salt Lake—a miniature ocean near Salt Lake City, Utah, U.S.A. It is 75 miles long and 40 miles wide, and its water is 7 times saltier than the ocean.

The great pleasure pier at Saltair resort, extends a mile out from the shore. Here are found all kinds of amusement concessions and one of the largest dancing pavilions in the world, with an unobstructed dance floor on which over 5,000 people can dance at the same time. At the end of the pier is a big bathing pavilion with 1,200 dressing rooms.

Bathing in Salt Lake is a delightful and unique experience. The water averages 22 per cent salt—nearly saturation—and is so buoyant that the human body cannot sink. One floats like a cork on the surface of this clear, deep blue salt water. On account of

the great density of the water, bathers are warned against diving, as there is danger of serious injury if a person strikes the water from a considerable height.

The only living thing that inhabits this great inland sea is a species of shrimp—a tiny little creature about one-quarter of an inch long. On one of the islands in the lake is a vast reservation where a large herd of buffalo are maintained, and it was here that one of the big scenes in The Covered Wagon was filmed.

Tremendous quantities of salt are obtained by solar evaporation from the brines of Salt Lake, three concerns alone producing 330 tons of salt per day. It is also an attraction for tourists.—Good News Magazine.

**£5,000 "Penny Blacks"**

**WONDERFUL POSTAGE STAMPS AT WEMBLEY.**

A very interesting collection of British and British Colonial postage stamps has been added to the wonders of Wembley.

In the Palace of Industry near, appropriately enough, the Postman's Gate and the stand of the well known stamp printers, Messrs. Waterlow & Sons, Ltd., are cases of postage stamps valued at £20,000.

The gem of the collection is a block of sixty of the old penny blacks, the first stamp ever issued. These stamps are in mint condition

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with margins complete, and are plate number 11, the last and rarest of the penny black plates. The block is in two parts, the top block of thirty-six stamps came from Lord Crawford's collection, the lower block of twenty-four from the Mirabeau collection. The complete block is undoubtedly the rarest known British piece in the world, the price of it being £5,000.

Another interesting collection of penny blacks is a reconstructed complete sheet of 24 stamps, every stamp being lightly cancelled and showing a clear effigy of Queen Victoria. This sheet took over thirty years to complete, and literally thousands of stamps were examined and discarded in the process.

There is also an exact coloured reproduction of the rarest stamp in the world, the British Guiana, 1856, sold by auction in Paris in 1922 from the famous Fervat collection for £7,343 to a New York collector.

In most of the Dominions and Colonial Pavilions are displayed collections of stamps of the particular

country occupying the pavilion. The Newfoundland collection is insured for over £1,000, and the South African collection contains a valuable and rare range of "three-cornered Capes."

Mr. Frank Godden, the well known philatelist, is exhibiting these treasures, and all interested in postage stamps should make a point of seeing them.
