



## LAST NIGHT'S FOOTBALL

Star and C.L.B. Play To Draw.  
Only a small attendance of spectators were present at St. George's Field last night to witness the Star and the C.L.B. battle for the points. The excitement, on the whole, was very good, when full playing time was up, both teams had each netted one goal, the match being declared a draw. The first goal was scored by the Star after five minutes of play, Caul being responsible. Upon ends being changed, the C.L.B. worked hard to even the score, but the desired result was not forthcoming until after twenty minutes of play, when LaFosse succeeded in netting the equalizer. The balance of the play proved to be fast and interesting, with honors very evenly divided, but no further goals resulted. Both teams now occupy the equal position in this season.

Reid, all of whom had donated prizes for the past three years. In sport he was grateful to all who had in any way assisted in the day's success, and he hoped all would be in perfect health and able to take part next year.

## INTER-TOWN SPORTS.

Next week will be an interesting one for those interested in sport, as on Monday a party of seventeen athletes will arrive from Grand Falls to

compete against city teams. A message was received yesterday stating that the team will be leaving on the 30th and they will arrive in town by Monday's express. The principal object in view is the playing of the inter-town series of football games for which a suitable cup is for competition. For the last few years teams have gone out from here to Grand Falls, and last year the series was won by the paper city. The first football game will be played on Tuesday night, and the other two on Thursday and Friday nights. On Wednesday afternoon there will be played either a cricket or a baseball game, and on Saturday a return game will be played so that there will be a whole week of interest. The football team of Grand Falls is the best that is available and, according to last year's result and the same played against the Guards at Grand Falls this year, a strong team from the city will be necessary if the honors are to be won. The Grand Falls cricket team has never met defeat and a contest between them and a city eleven should be interesting as not for years has an opportunity been given to have the city compete against outside players in a cricket game. The Grand Falls team will return home on Saturday next, and with them will go the city football team to complete the series of games for the cup at Grand Falls.

## PROFESSOR SEELEY DEMONSTRATES ON MONDAY NEXT.

The Professor comes to St. John's, in all true faith and sincerity of purpose, to perform these tests of endurance, and we feel assured that a bumper house will greet him on what will be the heaviest show of his repertoire. Professor Seeley is 26 years of age, Canadian born, and a man of wonderful physical development. He is the strongest man in the world for his size and weight. To give to the public a fair idea as to his stature, his dimensions will be found as follows:—Height, 6ft. 8½in.; Reach, 74in.; Neck, (contracted) 15½in.; (Normal) 18½in.; (Expanded) 22½in.; Biceps, 15½in.; Forearm, 13in.; Wrist, 8½in.; Chest (Contracted) 35in.; (Normal) 45in.; (Expanded) 55in.; Waist, 30in.; Thigh, 22in.; Calf, 14½in.; Ankle, 8in. His reach, of 74 inches, is exactly the same as Jack Dempsey, while his measurements from shoulder to shoulder are only 1½in. short of some of the world's famous men.

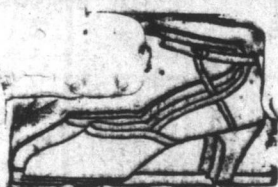

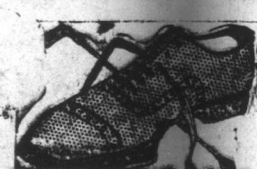

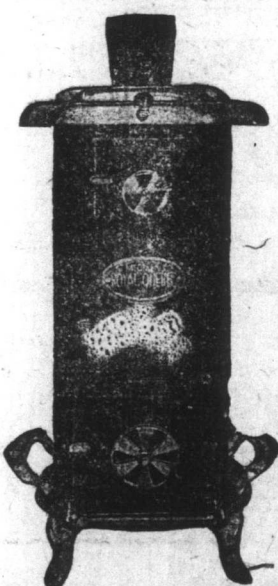
