It says, in part: "As we have already observed, Mr. Child's experience, bitter and unsatisfactory though it may be, is but a repetition of what has already ocurred, time and time again. vonder of it is that the municipal engineering profession in this country can hold any good men at all. The results that are obtained in face of the harassing and ignorant opposition of the members of our city councils speak well for the ability of the pro-

fession in general. "The office of the city engineer is perhaps the most difficult in the municipal service. It involves the construction and maintenance of great undertakings and the expenditure of large sums of public money. This in tself is sufficient responsibility for a man, even were everybody co-operating to the best of his ability and endeavoring to assist the engineer with that constructive criticism which is inspired by the genuine desire to opposition at every turn, where he as to devote half his time to collect ing evidence for the rebuttal of charges brought by unscrupulous and ignorant men having their own ends to serve, it is unfair to expect the work of his department to be above reproach.

Co-Operation and Enthusiasm "The success of most enterprises lies in the spirit in which they are carried out. Pouring a draught down a man's throat is a different thing from hav-ing him drink with you. 
