The doctor who operated and under whose care I am is a Captain Macbeth from Regina. He is a very clever surgeon, although he looks a couple or three years younger than I do.

the Chaplain Service and one cannot speak too highly of the men. They write home for people and supply us with material, have a friendly word for the thousands who go down through and a prayer for the ser-iously wounded. One of the Padres is from Port Arthur and was well acquainted with Rev. A. P. McDonald he has been exceptionally kind to me and has always came in every evening and had a short talk and a prayer.
