Mrs. E. de Gex has sold the old home "Eden Farm" on the 4th line of Metcalfe township, to Wm. Todball. The property comprises 100 acres and barns. The residence was destroyed by fire some time ago. The purchase price was \$7,500. Mrs. de Gex will reside in Stratford.

Mrs. Caroline Wilkins, Bowker widow of William Bowker, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. G. A. Love, in Springfield on Thursday last, in her 75th year. Mrs. Bowker resided for some time at Wardsville, where Mr. Love was in charge of the Royal Bank branch office.

The death occurred at her home at North Apple on Sunday, December 29, of Eliza Woodcock, widow of the late Thomas Woodcock, in her 83rd year. Funeral services were held from the residence of her son, Edward Woodcock, on Friday, December 22, interment being made in Appin cemetery. Mrs. John Henry of Glencoe is a daughter.

At the auction sale of the estate of the late Neil McNeil, of Ekfrid, held recently at the McKellar House by L. L. McTaggart, auctioneer, the fifty acres of land, house and other buildings, on the Ekfrid-McTaggart townline was sold to Wm. A. McCullum for \$3,450. The pasture farm of fifty acres, being part of lot 18 in the 5th concession of Ekfrid, was sold to Duncan Munroe for \$2,450.

Fred, Alfred has received word of the death of McGregor, Man of her aunt, Mrs. Charlotte Ward, in her 86th year. Mrs. Ward was a daughter of William Weekes, one of the earliest pioneers in this section of Ontario, who settled in Mosa township about the year 1830 and carried on the business of cabinet-making, specializing in the old fashioned spinning wheels. Mrs. Ward was born in Mosa and was the last surviving member of the family.

Rev. D. G. Paton, of Teeswater, formerly of Glencoe, had a miraculous escape about two weeks ago, when his car skidded and went over a 30-foot embankment. —OTTAWA—What is back of the movement for reducing letter postage? It is puzzling the officials of the post office department and of the finance department. The three-cent rate is regarded here and by business interests generally, as a most profitable form of taxation, in that it costs nothing to collect. The printing and handling of a three-cent stamp cost exactly the same as in the case of a two-cent stamp and the government collects 50 per cent more money. Taxes must be raised. Postage revenue bears most heavily on business concerns, and business concerns generally would probably prefer maintaining a three-cent letter rate than to pay the same amount and incur the greater labor, called for by stamps on cheques, receipts and other forms of nuisance taxes. They would also prefer, no doubt, to see a reduction in the income tax before any reduction in postal rates is made.

ANGLICAN
