\$5,000,000—Blaze in Paris.

London, Nov. 22.—A great fire broke out at Melbourne at 2 o'clock this morning and in a very short space of time did enormous damage. It started at the warehouse of Mr. Craig Williamson, in Elizabeth, Flinders and Swanston streets, and Flinders lane, with the exception of two buildings, on the Swanston street front, were destroyed within three hours. The burned section included many of the largest business houses in Melbourne. The buildings were completely gutted. As most of them contained soft goods, the flames progressed with a rapidity which defied all checking, and in the furious wind ashes and burning debris were carried into the suburbs, a distance of two miles. It is estimated that the loss will reach \$5,000,000, while the trade involved has received a serious set-
