LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Will the lady who lost a ten-dollar bill please call at this office.

—Mr. Ernie Cunningham, of Louville, Ky., is visiting his parents in East London.

—The members of the London Bicycle Club have decided (weather permitting) to take a run to Port Stanley on Sunday morning.

—Detective Rider went to Port Huron yesterday and returned in the evening with Agnes Murphy, the 15-year-old girl who left this city on Saturday night.

—Some fourteen conductors on the C. P. R., between Winnipeg and Montreal, were recently recipients of "blue envelopes." It is said others west of Toronto will be relieved this week.

—S. T. Reeves, of Windsor, owner of the steamer City of Windsor, yesterday completed arrangements whereby that boat will go on the route between Toronto and St. Catharines this season. The Lakeside has been on this route for some years but she will in future ply between Port Stanley and Cleveland.

—The Orient Minstrels are billed for the East End Hall on Thursday night. When this company appeared there last winter the hall was crowded to the doors. This will doubtless be repeated. There will be almost entire change of programme, and several new specialties will be introduced. Carter and Rockett, in their musical part will perform on 21 different instruments.

—Agnes Murphy, the 15-year-old girl who was brought home from Port Huron by Detective Rider, was charged with vagrancy at the Police Court this morning and remanded to jail for a week. It is not likely the man who induced her to leave with him will be apprehended.

The girl who was found at the tunnel station, gave her destination as California. Her parents, who live on Henry street, have not been in the country long.

—The Government has reached a decision in regard to the proposed changes in the postoffice inspectorships of Ontario, and the following may be regarded as the definite location of the different offices: Inspector Barker, of London, to go to Toronto; Inspector Spry, of Barrie, to go to London; Inspector Lang, of Kingston, to go to Barrie; Inspector Hopkirk will remain at Stratford and Inspector Hawken at Ottawa. The new man to be appointed will have charge of the Kingston division.

—The long-drawn-out case of Headford vs. McClary Manufacturing Company was settled at Osgoode Hall yesterday in favor of the company. The plaintiff, who worked at McClary's, was injured by falling down the well of a hoist in the works. The action for damages was non-suited here on the ground of contributory negligence on plaintiff's part. The Chancery Divisional Court refused to set aside the non-suit. Then plaintiff appealed to the Court of Appeal from the last order. The appeal has just been dismissed.

—The Ministerial Association discussed "Spiritualism" at its meeting yesterday. Rev. Charles Smith read a paper in opposition to the dogma. It was discussed at length. Rev. J. A. Murray thought that spiritualism should be scientifically examined. He told of his own experience at a seance in the city, and he was at a loss to account for what he saw as being the products of human agency. One of the "materializations" was that of a deceased member of his own congregation.

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Sales of Bankrupt Stocks.

The following sales were made at J. W. Jones' auction rooms yesterday afternoon: The stock of S. Fugo, tea merchant, city, valued at \$1,018 23, was purchased by Ferguson & Co. at 46 cents on the dollar.

The general stock of George Yates, Oil Springs, valued at \$5,855 14, was sold to Axton Merner, of the same place, at 54 1/2 cents.

The stock of Jennie E. Poile, Chatham, boots and shoes, valued at \$2,342 60, was sold to M. A. Cole, of the same place, at 70 1/2 cents on the dollar.

Mrs. Sadler's Funeral.

The funeral of the late Hannah C. Sadler, beloved wife of William Sadler, lot 73, Talbot road west, took place on Sunday to Kilworth, where the remains were interred in the Kilborn family cemetery. The funeral service was held in the Methodist Church, Kilworth, where a very touching sermon was delivered by the Rev. S. W. Blackford. The preacher referred to the Christian fortitude shown by the deceased during a long illness and the perfect trust with which she met "the swells of Jordan." The remains were followed to the last resting-place by one of the largest corteges ever seen in Westminster. The funeral home of Lambton turned out to pay their last respects to the memory of an estimable woman and to show their sympathy for a brother in his deep sorrow. The floral offerings were very fine, noticeable among them being those from the Lambeth Epworth League, and the choir from the same place rendered very appropriate music. A number of friends from the city were in attendance.

Death Calls Away the Aged.

London township has doubtless lost its oldest resident through the death of John Stephenson, which occurred at his residence, con. 12, lot 27, yesterday, at the age of 92 years. Mr. Stephenson, with his wife and family, arrived in Canada from Cumberland, England, in 1837. They made their way as best they could through the then heavily-wooded country, and settled on the old homestead, where Mr. Stephenson continuously resided for 57 years. The hardships and trials of early pioneer life were well-known to the family, and were added to by the death of the mother, which

occurred about six months after their arrival. The deceased was one of a large number who came to Canada from Cumberland in the same year, all of whom he survived. Mrs. George Shanklin and Mrs. K. Tindall, of Lobo township, Mrs. Armstrong, of London township, and Mrs. Whitefield, of Stuyvesant, are daughters of Mr. Stephenson, and John Stephenson, of Oxford county, is a son. John T. Stephenson, of this city, and Thomas Stephenson of Ailsa Craig, are grandchildren.

Mr. Wm. Pope, of 194 Albert street, died on Saturday from an attack of pneumonia. He came to London from Devonshire, England, in 1855, and had resided here ever since. Six sons and one daughter survive him. William, Samuel, James, Harry and Elizabeth live in the city, while one son is in British Columbia, and another is in Queensland, Australia. Samuel Pope, of London township, and Thomas Pope, of Thornbury, were brothers of deceased. The funeral took place yesterday and was held at Mount Pleasant, and was attended by a large number of friends of the family. Evangelist Carwell, of the Christian Workers, conducted the services, and Messrs. Wm. Corbett, Wm. Ching, O. W. Cambridge, W. Slater and Robert Quick, of this city, and E. Tanton, of London township, acted as pall-bearers.

The Bicycle Bylaw.

The Toronto cyclists have been victorious in their opposition to the bylaw which was introduced there. It is similar to that drafted by the city engineers here, though not so objectionable to riders as the latter's. It did not propose an annual fine on wheelmen as Mr. Graydon's does. The Toronto bylaw stipulated bells and lanterns should be carried and that the speed be limited to eight miles an hour. A committee of cyclists waited on the board of works in Toronto yesterday and argued so strongly against it that the board dropped the matter and decided to place no restrictions on the cyclists whatever. It was pointed out that the bell would only be a source of fright; that the bicycle lamp would be a mere glow-worm in the well-lighted streets of the city and would scare horses, and that eight miles an hour was only twice the speed of a pedestrian and much less than that of the street car. A resolution had been passed by Toronto clubs condemning reckless and unnecessarily fast riding, which should cover the point. Ten miles an hour would be a reasonable limit, the deputation thought. The large amount of money invested in cycling was also instanced.

The London wheelmen will wait on the local authorities and are confident that the proposed bylaw will be withdrawn, as in Toronto. If not their solid vote will be cast against its supporters.

Grand Trunk Engineers Confer.

DETROIT, Mich., April 17.—The general grievance committee of engineers of the Grand Trunk system west of St. Clair river are in session in this city. The members deny that any strike is being considered on this side of the river.

Fell Dead on the Street.

SARZIA, April 17.—Yesterday when Mr. F. O. Laid was returning to his work he was taken with heart failure and dropped dead on the sidewalk. He was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, about 71 years ago. He came to Sarzia about 40 years ago, and has been a resident ever since. He has been in the employ of T. Symington & Co. for the last eighteen years. He leaves a wife, six sons and four daughters. He was a member of St. Andrew's Church here.

Terrible Affair Near Brantford.

BRANTFORD, April 17.—The story of a horrible assault comes from the Indian reserve. It is stated that Mrs. Williams, together with her husband and two other Indians, were walking near Caledonia one day last week, when they were assailed by a party of six whites. The latter, it is claimed, drove the husband and his companions away, and then took the woman into the bush and repeatedly assaulted her. A hearing is taking place to-day at Caledonia.
