TORONTO, May 11—11 p.m.—The depression which was over the lake region last night has moved to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, causing rain to-day in the St. Lawrence valley. The depression which was in Alberta has moved to Manitoba, causing warmer southwesterly winds in that Province, and cool northwest winds further west.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—The police have been supplied with their new summer clothing.

—Mr. Fred Poole, of this city, has gone to Chicago, where he will in future reside.

—Mr. Jas. S. Marshall has disposed of his livery and hack business to Mr. H. Brown, of Goderich.

—Sheriff's Officer Graham has returned from Kingston, where he safely lodged Bigamis Guest in the penitentiary.

—A promising student of Huron College, Mr. James Harrison, died yesterday on Oxford street from rapid consumption.

—Doing business without advertising is like pulling against the tide; you may make progress, but it will make you sweat to do so.

—The Provincial voters' lists for London West have been completed before Judge Wm. Elliot. Everything is now ready for the election.

—Mr. John Mason, of South London, is still very ill. His daughter, Mrs. (Rev.) F. H. Sanderson has arrived from Spirit Lake, Iowa.

—It is rumored in G. T. R. circles that hereafter the pay car will be dispensed with, and payment made by sending a cash pouch to the large centers.

—A team belonging to Wm. Mulloy, a lightning rod agent, ran away in London township yesterday afternoon and made a five mile trip on Adelaide street, bringing up against a tree on the corner of Dundas.

—Sir C. Macbeth, son of Col. Macbeth, of this city, stood first in the list of first year pupils in the recent examination of the School of Practical Science, Toronto.

—Mr. Thomas Coughlin, of No. 2 Oxford street, was sliding a barrel of beer down the cellar of Carling's brewery the other day, when the steps broke and he was badly crushed about the chest. He is in a critical condition.

—Miss Tena White, the young lady who jumped from a street car in South London the other day, has almost recovered from her injuries. No bones were broken. It was reported that Miss White was unlikely to recover.

—A game of baseball was played on the fair grounds Friday afternoon between the St. Peter's school and Holy Angels' school, resulting in favor of St. Peter's school by 22 to 11. Batteries—McCaullin and Mullins; Healey and Vincent.

—Robert Duncan and John Fountain pleaded guilty before Squire Lacey yesterday to committing a nuisance in London West by depositing night soil on the premises of Wm. Kelly, Center street. Sentence was reserved for a week.

—Auctioneer Jones yesterday disposed of the stock of Alexander Smith, Belmont, amounting to \$1,612, to Alex. Smith at 49 cents. Mr. Jones also sold lot No. 5, Bruce street, to Mr. J. H. Dunn at \$5 a foot. The terrace on Askin street was withdrawn at \$5,500.

—One of the campaign documents doing duty in the London contest is a small book bearing on the title page the inscription, "What Meredith has Done for London in Twenty Years." The pages of the book are eloquently and appropriately blank.—[Sturford Beacon.]

—Mr. T. Wistow, flower pot manufacturer, Hamilton road, East London, who was recently burned out, has rebuilt on a larger scale with all the improved machinery obtainable in the same place. Mr. Wistow expects to be able to start up on Tuesday and will then be able to supply all orders next week.

—Donald McLean, of Strathroy, was brought to jail this morning by Chief Constable Dodd, of that place. McLean got into an altercation with Marshal Kellistone and is said to have shot at him with intent to kill. The prisoner is believed to be insane and was committed by Magistrate Noble for examination.

—Court Forest City, No. 5744, Ancient Order of Foresters in the east End, organized a Robin Hood drill corps in April last with 30 members. Their uniforms will be as near as possible the original Robin Hood dress. Their first appearance in public will be at their benefit concert in the East End Hall on 18th inst. On May 24, July 2 and Aug 6 next, they take part in drill competitions at Galt, Paris and Ingersoll.

—Constables Ward and Ward, of London West, have succeeded in recovering five of the eight hats stolen from the London West school on Thursday. They were found in a house on Bathurst street, occupied by a family named Campbell. Mand Campbell, Eliza Cowan (York street), Annie Williams (Bathurst street north) and George Rogers (Bathurst street) have been summoned in connection with the theft. The other three hats are supposed to have been burned, as a portion of one was found in a stove at the Williams' house.

—Stray Shots.

Among the late arrivals at Wolsey barracks is Private Morgan, of Hamilton, who yesterday enlisted in her Majesty's service for three years.

—Bugle-Major Walsh, Bandsman Barrett, Duff, Farnsworth, McDonnell, Williams and Buglers Kennedy and Walsh left by the C. P. R. at 5 p.m. yesterday to attend the military tournament at Toronto on the 17th inst.

Extra drills have been in progress for some time past at the barracks. So far the "Left Half" show more proficiency than the "Right Half."

The Police Court.

Mrs. Elizabeth Yates, who keeps a

market stall, appeared in the police court to-day with a badly bruised face, caused by contact with her husband's fist, she said. Henry Yates, the defendant, was bound over to keep the peace.
John Conn, a youthful incorrigible, was sent for an indefinite term to the reformatory. Johnny is only 9 years old but is beyond parental control.
Harriet Williams hobbled up serenely for the 25th time since 1885 and as there was no guarantee that she would not duplicate the record if leniency were shown, she was sent to the Mercer for one year. Harriet was drunk.
The long-handled-shovel assault case of Mrs. Mary Nash against Prof. Thomas Passmore was withdrawn by the former.
Mrs. Hugh McCurdy accused her husband of non-support and Hugh was remanded for a week. A batch of drunks were dealt with according to their deserts.
Street Railway Company vs. City of London.

A dispatch received from Toronto last night says: "In the Court of Appeal to-day in the case of the London Street Railway Company vs. the city of London, Robinson, Q.C., and Helmut (London) for the plaintiffs, appealed from an order of the Queen's Bench Divisional Bench, reversing the judgment for the plaintiffs and dismissing the action with costs.
The action was brought to recover from the defendants for tearing up certain ties and tracks of the plaintiffs and to restrain the defendants from preventing the plaintiffs from proceeding with laying down their tracks and switches upon Dundas street west of Richmond street in the city of London.
"The question in the action turned upon the construction of an agreement between the plaintiffs and defendants and a bylaw of the defendants under the second clause in the bylaw the plaintiffs are entitled to lay a single track at the point in question. The court below held that the plaintiffs had laid down a single track and siding in a form not to be distinguished from a double track, and in a form and manner forbidden in the case of a single track and siding, and in so proceeding were wholly without justification; and the defendants, being responsible by law for the condition of the highway, were well within their rights in interfering with the plaintiffs' work and in restoring the highway to its proper condition."

They Feared Another Election.

OTTAWA, May 12.—Dr. Reid, M. P. for Grenville, Ont., who placed his resignation in the hands of the Conservative whip, Mr. Taylor, on Thursday, and took the first train home, has withdrawn it, as the Government has saved in to his demerit, and will reduce the duty on glucose, which enters largely into the manufacture of starch. Dr. Reid is the general manager of the big starch works at Edwardsburg.
