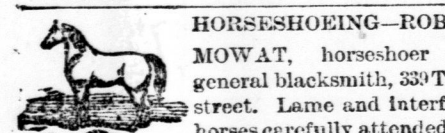

—Miss Eva Roche, who has been so

improve.

—Mr. Adam Beck, city, is one of the
incorporators of the Canadian Jockey
Club, with a capital of \$10,000.

—The death is announced on Aug. 10,
at Victoria, B. C., of Charlotte Emily,
the daughter of Hugh O'Neill, formerly of this
city.

—This is the season of the year when it

—Wm. Schuyler, an Indian from Del-
aware, is serving ten days in the county
jail for assaulting a fellow redman named
Henry Daxator.

—Rev. Mr. Laneley, pastor of Dundas

had a cordial welcome back by the congre-
gation.

—Mr. Wm. Moore, an old and esteemed
resident of Maple Place, South London, is
seriously ill. His condition has become so

—Wm. B. Chisholm was taken to King-
ston Penitentiary this morning to serve his
three-year sentence for horse stealing. He
was in charge of Deputy Sheriff Water-
worth.

with 120 chieftains. This beats the
record. The camp will be known as

—Thomas Morikin, of Massillon, was

Morikin lost his license in May last.

—A young son of Mr. Gorman, of Lon-
