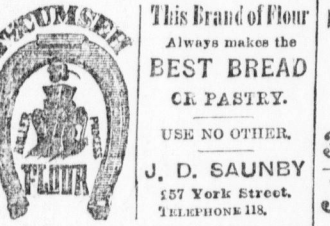

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KEPT IN THE DARK.

Committeemen Object to Unauthorized Deputations.

Col. Clarke's Proposition Comes Up Again—An Over-Assessment Rectified.

Col. Clarke's proposition for an electrical franchise occupied the attention of No. 1 committee for a few minutes last evening. A resolution of the City Council was passed, suggesting that an amended proposition be secured from Col. Clarke, if possible, providing that he would furnish material for paving and perform the work throughout the existence of the franchise. During the second five years he would also have to pay the corporation 5 per cent. of the earnings, and, for the remainder of the term, 7 per cent.

Solitor Johnston, who was present, said that the matter of prepayment was being considered by Col. Clarke. He thought, however, that in the event of this concession being made an arrangement would have to be effected by which the company's compulsory construction of the water works and sewerage system might be nullified. He could not say anything absolutely definite regarding the matter. At the council's meeting on Monday evening he would submit a written agreement regarding the percentage.

Thomas Holland wrote asking for a grant in aid of the Salvation Army Rescue Home. The city treasurer was asked to look into the state of the relief fund. He will report later and a decision will be left in abeyance for the present.

In regard to the city's claim upon certain school moneys in the hands of Col. Lays, amounting to \$1,400, a committee composed of Ald. Moule, Ald. Parnell and Ald. Meredith were appointed to confer with township authorities relative to an agreement. The city, however, holds more of the township moneys, collected as debenture rates, than the claim mentioned.

Ald. Meredith proposes that a set-off be instituted and that the balance be paid to the township.

E. Meredith, Q.C., who was over-assessed to the extent of \$2,000, will refund \$88. Stevens & Burns wrote regarding an excessive charge in their local improvement rates. This was referred to the engineer.

Mrs. Jane King's application for a remission of taxes was filed, as was also W. A. Howard's appeal against statute labor tax.

In passing the usual expense accounts, two entries were taken exception to be Ald. Parnell and Ald. Welford. These were incurred by the deputations which went to Toronto in connection with the car shops.

Parnell asserted, were supposed to be settling these questions, but half the members were kept entirely in the dark regarding the settlements.
