He said their course had been far from commendable and little in keeping with their character as Catholic Christians. He concluded as follows: "I only say that it is your duty now to show yourself good Catholics, submit to the government of your bishop, attend strictly to your own affairs, return to your church as Catholics, and you peace and success will follow.' Leading Catholics state that they will send a delegate to Rome, in spite
