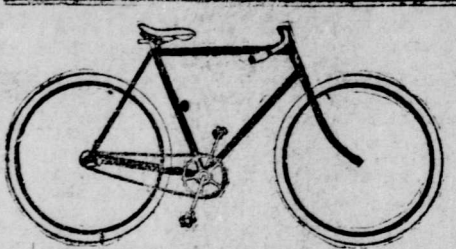

WESTERN FAIR ANNUAL MEETING

A Satisfactory Showing Made—The Directors Ask the Co-operation of the Citizens to Make the Fair a Success.

The annual meeting of the Western Fair Association was held in the city hall yesterday afternoon, with a large attendance. Lieut.-Col. Gartshore occupied the chair, and there were also present First Vice-President Little, Second Vice-President Bogue, Secretary J. A. Nelles and Treasurer D. McKenzie.

The directors' report for 1899 showed the affairs of the association to be in a satisfactory condition, and emphasized the fact that last year's exhibition was one of the most successful in the history of the association. The displays in the several departments were exceptionally fine and highly satisfactory. In the agricultural and horticultural departments the improvement was most noticeable. The live stock and agricultural implement departments were, as usual, the leading features of the fair. The increase in the amount contributed for premiums was over \$1,200. The improvements in the buildings and grounds, which had been under contemplation for some time, were duly carried out by the board. There were some minor improvements that would still further enhance the general attractiveness and beauty of the park, such as the laying out of flower beds, planting of more trees, shrubs, etc., and it was suggested that

something should continue to be done each year along this line. Attention was drawn to the Provincial Fat Stock, Dairy and Dressed Poultry Show, which was held in December last. The preparation of the necessary buildings to accommodate the live stock, block tests and poultry exhibition cost a considerable sum, and while of no particular direct benefit to the fair association, yet aided in keeping in touch with the exhibitors. It was to be regretted that a greater number of farmers and citizens did not appreciate the opportunity of hearing the lectures and witnessing the demonstrations, which were of an educational and instructive character. Reference was made to the retirement of Mr. Thomas A. Browne as secretary, and appreciation expressed of the untiring zeal and devotion which Mr. Browne had displayed. Thanks were tendered the railway and express companies, the press and those who contributed to the funds.

The financial statement is a most encouraging one. The receipts totaled \$34,642.04, and the disbursements \$32,010.54, leaving a balance in the bank of \$2,631.50. The assets were \$43,332.44, and the liabilities nil.

In introducing the report President Gartshore said that with the exception of the phenomenal year of 1898, the receipts for 1899 exceeded those of any previous year. There was spent during the year \$7,132.12 on buildings and improvements to the grounds. He thought the directors had a right to expect more loyal assistance from the citizens generally. The fair week should be devoted to the entertaining of thousands of visitors, and no time nor means should be grudged to send all home well satisfied. He suggested that an effort be made to make this a gala week. The city should be especially illuminated, stores decorated and plenty of music provided, creating, as it does, enthusiasm and good-fellowship. There was too much lukewarmness in these matters. The grounds were the property of the city, and should be maintained in a creditable manner by the city authorities. Reference was made to the death of one of the organizers of the fair, viz., the late James Cousineau, who had faith in the future of the Western Fair at a time when enterprises of this nature were little known.

In referring to the financial statement, the treasurer said the Western Fair was the only exhibition in the Dominion that never had to report a deficit.

The report was adopted. A number of communications were read and referred to the new board. It was moved and seconded that the association protest against any grant being made to the Toronto exhibition by either the provincial or Dominion parliaments.

In the discussion which followed, Col. Leys, M. P. P., was given credit for having blocked the proposed grant to the Toronto exhibition in the closing hours of the last session of the Ontario Legislature.

Ex-Mayor Taylor expressed himself as opposed to this motion as embodying a dog-in-the-manger policy. He moved in amendment that if any grant be made to the Toronto exhibition a similar grant be asked for by the Western Fair. The amendment carried.

On motion of Mr. Green, seconded by Mr. McNeill, the board of directors was re-elected for the ensuing year. The board is as follows: Lieut.-Col. W. M. Gartshore, Lieut.-Col. F. B. Leys, A. M. Smart, Geo. Taylor, W. J. Reid, W. M. Spencer, R. Shaw-Wood, Jas. H. Brown, W. R. Hobbs, J. S. Pearce, J. W. Little and R. A. Carters.

Mr. Archie Smith urged upon the directors the advisability of supplementing the grant of the Shorthorn Breeders' Association with the additional grant of \$500.

The new board of directors met subsequently and re-elected the officers and chairman of committees. Lieut.-Col. Gartshore is president, ex-Mayor J. W. Little, first vice-president, and Mr. Allen Bogue, second vice-president; Mr. J. A. Nelles, secretary, and Mr. D. McKenzie, treasurer.
