ROCK VS. REVOLVER

Andrew Johnston Charged With Assaulting Geo. Ross—Remanded Till Monday—The Story of the Assault.

Andrew Johnston, charged in the police court this morning with assault on George Ross with intent to do grievous bodily harm, was remanded till Monday to allow him to procure counsel. Johnston was willing to proceed with his trial, but owing to the serious nature of the charge the magistrate advised the securing of counsel. The charge is the outcome of a lively fracas which took place on Grand avenue, South London, between 9 and 10 o'clock last night. Ross, who is a married man, conducts a tailoring business at 280 Richmond street. He was walking along Grand avenue with Mrs. Mary Beaubier, of Wellington street, when a man sprang from the darkness and struck Ross on the side of the face with a large stone. Johnston, who is alleged to be the mysterious assailant, then struck Ross with his fist, and the battle raged fiercely for some minutes. Ross drew a revolver and fired two shots. P. C. Tom McDonald heard of the trouble, and arrived to find all three parties covered with blood. Mrs. Beaubier being engaged in an effort to separate the contestants. The men were taken to the police station, when Ross was released and the charge entered against Johnston.

Mrs. Beaubier, the supposed cause of the trouble, has been working for Ross for a couple of months past, and is said to have a husband in St. Thomas.

Johnston, who was remanded last year, and previously to opening in business he was employed as cutter by a Dundas street retail store.

The case against Richard Barnwell, charged with wife-beating, was adjourned for a week to allow the couple to make arrangements for separation.
