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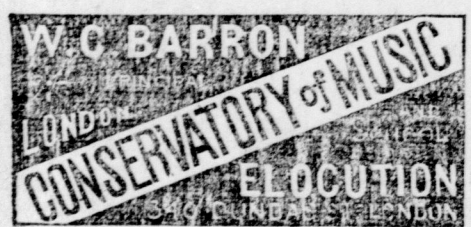

PREACHED OF ETERNAL LIFE.

Splendid Sermon Delivered by Rev. Mr. Whiting.

Mitchell Minister Attracts Attention by Able Discourses in Dundas Methodist Church.

Yesterday was anniversary Sunday for the Epworth League of the Dundas Center Methodist Church, and for the occasion the pastor of the church, Rev. C. T. Scott, changed pulpits with Rev. R. Whiting, of Mitchell. If the congregation at Mitchell appreciated the London preacher as much as his people appreciated theirs, they were glad indeed that the anniversary and the system of exchange gave them the chance to hear him, for few ministers who have visited here in a long, long time have, if the expression may be used, scored a success greater than Mr. Whiting's. His was the success that comes of a marvelous message, adequately, beautifully expressed, with grace of thought and of expression.

Mr. Whiting's method, his style, are peculiar and striking at periods. He preaches in an easy, conversational manner—the parliamentary style, as it is called, that is often so effective, and uses every-day words, terse, and meaningful, not hesitating at times to speak the phrases of menial slang. If they express his thought more concisely and positively. At other times his speech is eloquent, his language beautiful and easy-flowing, and words, voice and gesture are in unison with the nobility of the thoughts that arouse his eloquence.

All who heard him yesterday could not be other than glad to have him visit London again and pleased if, ultimately, he might become the pastor of one of London's churches.

Mr. Whiting's sermon was about that which is real life, and his presentation was, briefly, that the life that is life indeed, wholly satisfying and successful, is not the material life of the tangible, visible world, but of the invisible, spiritual world, the world of God; that, for example, the man who sees no more than his eyes see, and hears no more than his ears hear, who goes after things with his five senses only, is the man who never attains to true success and never enjoys the life that is real and eternal.

If that were not true, he argued, he would have to alter our relations to many things—to literature, music, art and politics among others—because in literature it was the author who got behind the material, and understanding them, wrote of thoughts and motives and influences, who was acquainted with the great things of the men of principle and motive. So in religion, he hoped to see not men who thought of it as "holding a pew at so much a year, or repeating a formula at so much a word, or hearing an anthem at so much a yard," but men who got behind words and formulas to a true conception of God.

Finding that diplomacy and logical reasoning did not convert her to his own viewpoint, Timothy apparently resorted to force, for Mrs. Timothy alleges that he first struck her several times with his fist, and then applied his heavy boots to her person in such an energetic and well-directed manner that she made her exit hurriedly through the door of her happy little home, which, Mrs. Timothy further alleges, is her house, anyway. Feeling a not unnatural resentment at Timothy's cavalier attentions, Mrs. Timothy went to Squire Lacey, and laid an information against her husband lord and master. Detective Ward made a short informal call on Timothy, who consented to accompany the officer back to the city. Timothy was lodged in jail, where he will meditate on the mutability of human affairs until Saturday next.

HOW MAN MAY KNOW HIMSELF.

Some Simple Rules of Life Which Everyone May Apply.

Interesting and Instructive Address Delivered Yesterday by Rev. W. J. Clark.

Rev. W. J. Clark, of the First Presbyterian Church, addressed the men's meeting in the Auditorium yesterday afternoon on the subject, "Self-Knowledge, Self-Reverence, Self-Control." He began by stating that man's personality was a very curious subject of study. In spite of the fact that his life depends to a large extent on his natural ancestry, he possesses a personality peculiar to himself. One may admire another's ability or cleverness, yet would be unwilling to trade, as it were, his personality for that of anyone else. Everyone feels that he would rather be himself than anyone else on God's earth. It is of the utmost importance, that, considering this fact, each should be acquainted with himself. "Know thyself" is one of the oldest of commands, and each one should know himself so far as his bodily equipment is concerned. There is that individuality in a man's physical constitution that is as marked as the different faces we meet, and it should be the aim of each to understand that individuality, to understand one's weak points, in order to be on guard. There is a saying that when a man is forty, he is either his own physician or a fool. There is no reason why a person should wait so long before knowing himself. Although these are fundamental principles in regard to health, yet general rules are not specific; the food one man would dare eat, another would not dare to partake of; or, in other words, one's meat is often another's poison. The question arises, how are we to know ourselves? By observation and study, by hard, persistent endeavor, and in no other way.

The speaker dwelt upon the importance of clear and well-defined ideas regarding the bent of one's mind. Apropos of study, one, after ascertaining his weak point, should not in any way neglect it. He will, however, achieve the best results if he follow the line of least resistance and thereby avoid the difficulties of the direction most congenial to his tastes and ability. If there is anything in which one can naturally excel, he should put forth his most strenuous efforts in that direction. The happiest men are those who have found their proper sphere of action. Important as it is that men should know themselves, this alone is not enough; they must respect themselves. True, perhaps, one person counts for but little in the world; nevertheless, he has a duty to perform in that no one else can adequately perform for him.

Mr. Clark also emphasized the importance of discipline—the necessity of keeping the passions under control. Self-control is one of the characteristics of noble manhood. "When we have learned to control ourselves," said the speaker, "we will be able to control every ounce of muscle." In conclusion the speaker quoted the following:

"Like him who faces what he must With step triumphant and a heart of cheer; Who fights the daily battle without fear. Sees his hopes fail, yet keeps unflinching trust. That God is God, that somehow, true and just, His plans work out for mortals; not a lie. Is shed, when fortune, which the world holds dear, grasps—better, with love, a crust. Nor living in dishonor; envies not. Nor ever murmurs at his humbler lot; But with a smile and words of hope, gives zest. To every trial. He alone is great. Who by a life he conquers fate."

WILLIAM DOXTATER: HIS TRIBULATIONS

From the Shadow of the Grave to the Gloom of the Jail.

Wm. Doxtater, Jun., is a young Indian of the Muncey Reserve, who seems to be perpetually on the hunt for trouble. Judging from the evidence extant, William appears to be a brilliant success in his chosen profession. Only a short time ago William was plugged half-full of heavy leaden pills by his irate father-in-law, Chief John Henry. William went away at once and became quite ill, so ill that a local daily printed an account of his death, accompanied by a sympathetic obituary. William, however, had not died, and he very unfeelingly refused to do so, even after shown the account of his lamented demise.
