CAMPAIGN ELOQUENCE

Electors Had It in Plenty at the City Hall.

Numerous Municipal Candidates Aired Their Views.

Mr. Pocock Considers Himself Legally a Member of the Water Commission.

A meeting of the electors of London hall, where the mayoralty and aldercandidates set forth their reasons for seeking the confidence of the The attendance was fairly large and those present showed considerable enthusiasm as the speakers those who had held positions of civic trust for their alleged shortcomings. Owing to the absence of several nominees the meeting was of somewhat shorter duration than was anticipated at its beginning. The time allotted the speakers was, for the mayoralty candidates, 15 minutes each; for aldermanic aspirants, 10 minutes

Dr. Roome as chairman impressed upon the audience the importance of the coming municipal contest. He considered the coming election greater importance to the citizens of London than an election of representatives to the Legislative Assembly or to the House of Commons. The city of London was both progressive and beautiful, and it was of the utmost moment that it should have efficient

On the platform were the mayoralty candidates-Messrs. P. Birtwistle, W. H. Bartram, Ald. Parnell, Winnett and Cooper—and aldermanic candidates, Messrs. McRae, Stephen O'Meara, and John Pocock, candidate for the position of water commissioner.

P. BIRTWISTLE. Mr. Birtwistle was the first to acdress the meeting. He stated that in accepting the nomination for mayor it was his intention to introduce the public business the same principles that have been found successful private enterprises. The speaker stated that he had no record to present in the matter of experience as alderman, but of the last four gentlemen to occupy the position of mayor, three of them had no previous experience in the city coucil, Continuing, the speaker stated that the city debt and taxation had been on the increase, and that if the business principles adopted in the administration of civic affairs had been used as the guiding principles of a man'se individual business, it is hard to tell what the result would be. He referred to Lord Rosebery's Edinburgh speech, where the statement was made DECOMPOSION CONTROL TO the effect that successful business men should conduct the affairs of the country. Bartram stated that he appeared before the electors of London as a candidate for mayor because he wanted to give them an opportunity of electing a man who would act on constitutional principles. Referring to the extension of the Port Stanley lease, the speaker stated that the road belonged to the city, and that, accordingly, the city council had no right to bind the people for 30 years hence. The aldermen waited until the last meeting of the year before they touched it. Mr. Bartram disagreed with the previous speaker in regard to the need of business men.

"We have been cursed with business men already," said he. "What we want are honest men, and we want to even watch them. You grant your mayor greater privileges than are accorded the King of England. There is an irresponsible and desperate chief magistrate not only here, but also in

Toronto and Ottawa." The speaker stated that a true British subject, recognized and acknowledged no power but the law. He went on to point out the difference between a lawyer and a solicitor. According to Mr. Bartram, we have no lawyers in Canada; we have only solicitors, and a olicitor is a man who will do anything he is paid for doing.

ALD, PARNELL, Ald. Parnell, in the course of an able and energetic speech, referred chiefly to his record in the council, leaving to another time other important matters that are now before the public. He said at the outset that the issues now before the public were of such a character that if a candidate could not find enough to discuss without dealing in personalities, it was an evidence beyond dispute that the candidate was not worthy of the position he sought. He referred, also, to the campaign of four years ago and said that, although defeated on that occasion, he had polled an extremely large vote-larger than that polled by candidates for years prior to that time. It was only after mature and deliberate consideration, he said, and the support of his candidature he referred of the council.

HIS RECORD. As chairman of the finance committee in the latter half of 1893, when he succeeded Ald. 
