WEEKLY REVIEW. The markets during the past six days The markets during the past six days have been fairly well attended, considering the condition the roads are in. The various lines of farm produce have been well represented, especially hay and dressed hogs. There was no material change in prices from those quoted in last week's market report. The demand was good for most of the produce offered, and only in a few instances were there any concession made in prices from those quoted.

Grain-Oats, as usual, formed the bulk of the offerings in this line; all told, there would be about 120 loads offered; sales were made at 93c to 95c per cwt, or from 31%c to 32%c per bu. Very little wheat offered, which brought \$1 15 per

Butter and Eggs-The supplies in this line have been fairly large and prices seem a trifle easier, at 18c to 19c per pound for crocks and 19c to 20c for pound rolls in basket lots. Eggs are in good demand, at 19c to 20c per dozen for crates and 20c to 21c and in some cases 22c for basket lots. Potatoes—There have not been as many

Potatoes—There have not been as many loads offered as in the previous week; the market is firm, at 90c, 95e and \$1 per bag by the load and \$1 to \$1.05 by the single bag; there is no prospect that prices will go lower, at least during the winter, as a large number of the farmers have disposed of all they intend to sell. Apples-Sales have been fairly good, at per barrel for supposed hand-picked, t which in reality were only seconds; by the bag they sell at 25c to 50c.
Dressed Hogs—There have been upwards
of 250 offered during the week; prices are
firmer and the demand good, at \$7.75 to per cwt, with \$8 per cwt as the

Poultry—The offerings have been up to e average, and the demand good; there ve been a lot of live turkeys purchased here for the export trade, at 8c per bound; dressed turkeys sell at 10c to 01/2c in large lots; geese sell at 61/2c to 70 per pound, or from 75c to 50c each; dressed ducks, 60c to 90c per pair; live chickens at 60c to 80c per pair; live chickens sell at 45c to 60c per pair.

Live Hogs—The price paid on Monday last was \$5.70 and \$5.75 per cwt; it is like ly that the same figures will prevail on Monday next, although the market is ex-pected to go lower; a number of sows were purchased here at 4c per pound, and stags at 2c per pound, live weight; small pigs sell at \$5 to \$7.50 per pair.

Butchers' Meats—The market is slow in this line, at the following prices: Beef, common, \$5 per cwt by the carcase, and \$6 per cwt for helfer beef; lamb is easier, at \$7 to \$8 per cwt by the carcase; mutton, \$5 to \$7, and veals, \$6 to \$750.
