BARBARITY IN PHILIPPINES

Atrocious Beeds of Natives and U S. Troops.

Further Testimony Regarding Application of the "Water Cure" and the Destruction of Villages.

Washington, May 5. - L. E. Hallock, of Boston, Mass., formerly a sergeant and then a private in Company I, 26th Volunteer Infantry, testified on Saturday before the senate committee on the Philippines, concerning the practice of the "water cure" in the Philippines Hallock told of the infliction of the cure upon a dozen natives at the town of Leon, Province of Panay. He said they were captured and torture in order to secure information of the murder of Pte. O'Herne, of Company I, who had been not only killed but roasted and otherwise tortured before death ensued. Capt. Glenn, in charge of a scouting party, had first secured a confession of participation in this crime from one native, who implicated twelve others.
