It was also resolved that an imperial ukase should be drawn up in the briefest terms possible, and that steps assuring realization of the reform scheme should be taken. The committee is of the opinion that success would be rendered sure by the publication of its decisions, which will be confirmed by the Emperor. The decisions already taken were sanctioned by his majesty on Jan.
