ONTARIO'S BAD BOYS

Juvenile Criminals in This Province Head the List.

Ottawa, Nov. 15. - Ontario has onethird of the boys of the Dominion, but supplies over half the boy crim-

This was one of the points in an address delivered yesterday by George Johnston, statistician, before the Ministerial Association.

He said larceny was the chief crime committed by juveniles, forming 78 per cent of the convictions in 1903 boys under sixteen. The Province of Ontario occupied an unenviable position in regard to juvenile crime, for while every million of the other provinces showed 180 boy criminals, Ontario showed 267 in every million. In other words, while Ontario has about one-third of the boys, it has over one-half of the boy criminals of the Dominion. There was a striking disproportion of boy criminals to girl criminals. Out of 908,119 girls under fifteen years of age in Canada in 1901 only 25 were convicted for indictabl offenses. Of these Ontario contrib-uted 18 out of 337,443 girls under fifteen, and all other provinces contributed seven out of a total of 570,714
