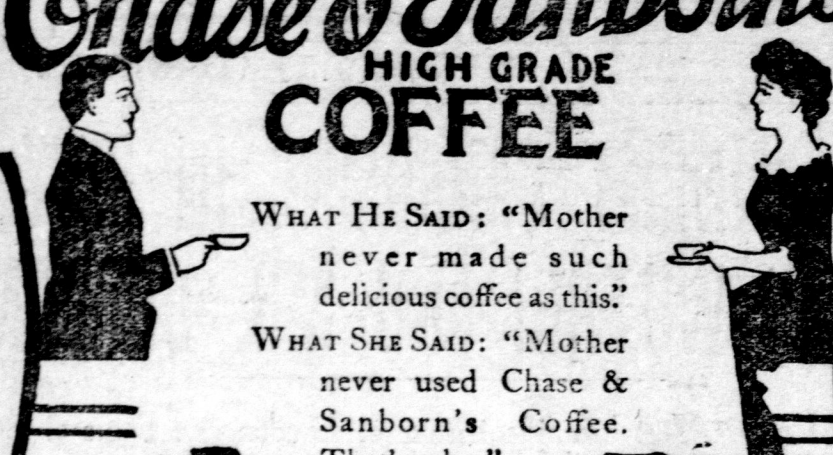

STRATHROY FAIR OPENED EXHIBITION CREDITABLE ONE

Displays in the Crystal Palace and Other Buildings Are Very Fine—Officers Are Enthusiastic and Look for a Large Attendance.

The annual fair at Strathroy opened today with a large crowd and possibly the best exhibits in its history. The grounds and buildings are in first-class shape and everything is moving along splendidly.

The judges began work on the exhibits yesterday and their work will be completed by this evening.

Crystal Palace.

The Crystal Palace presents a very fine appearance, many new and outside exhibits being shown.

The display of art and fancy work in the galleries is beautiful, and would make a creditable showing for many of the larger exhibitions. Oil, water color and crayon work are much in evidence, beside a quantity of excellent needle work.

The Agricultural Hall is also well filled, although the directors report that the quantity of exhibits is not so great as last year. The quality of the products is far superior, however. Many bags of the finest specimens of grain are being shown.

Apples, fruit and vegetables are liberally displayed.

The poultry building is well stocked with beautiful birds.

The Programme.

A big programme of sports and speed events have been arranged for this afternoon with a splendid band concert and moving picture show this evening. Four Hundred Cotton Mills Are Idle

Manchester, Eng., Sept. 21.—More than 400 cotton mills in Lancashire are idle today as a result of the dispute over wages between the operatives and employers. This means that 4,000,000 spindles are wholly or partially stopped, that more than \$25,000,000 of capital is not bringing in any return, and that 140,000 operatives are without work, and losing something over \$700,000 in wages a week.

In view of the present glutted condition of the market it is not believed that this cessation of work will entail heavy damages to the employers.

It is not felt that the strike will last long, for the cardroom workers are expected to take a second ballot and agree to the five per cent reduction in wages, which already has been accepted by the spinners.

So far the idle operatives have been perfectly orderly.

Many Fall Before Cholera Spectre

St. Petersburg, Sept. 21.—The cholera continues to increase rapidly day by day in St. Petersburg. The efforts of the authorities here in stopping the sale of liquor between Saturday and Monday and the other preventative measures taken have had little effect in checking the spread of the epidemic.

Between noon Sunday and noon today the municipal hospitals reported

the entrance of 330 cases and 155 deaths, and the addition of the statistics from the military and suburban hospitals for the same period will swell this total to formidable proportions. There are 34 cases of policemen alone in the Semenovskiy military hospitals.

Dispatches received here from three provinces report 488 new cases and 201 deaths in 24 hours, Rostov-on-the-Don furnishing 182 cases and 80 deaths.

SAILS IN THE AIR FOR OVER HOUR

A Remarkable Record Made by Wilbur Wright With His Aeroplane.

Le Mans, Sept. 21.—In the presence of the officials of the Aero Club, of Sarthe, a large number of French and foreign officers and aeroplane experts and a widely cheering crowd, numbering 10,000, Wilbur Wright, the American aeroplane pilot, after a long and tiresome flight of over an hour, landed his machine, a four-wheeled aeroplane, with a four-mile an hour breeze, the aviator got away nicely, sailing majestically over the field amid thundering cheers. After rounding the upper turn Wright swept back to where the thousands were gathered and began describing ellipses. Wright at first manifested extraordinary prudence, flying so low that he seemed almost to skim the earth, but finally rose to greater heights.

CANADIAN TEACHERS' TRIP

British Teaching Association Give Many Invitations to Visitors.

London, Sept. 21.—Canadian teachers arriving in London are promptly made honorary members of the London Teachers' Association, and given all the privileges of membership. Many teachers' associations are specially inviting them to their gatherings, and already addresses at local teachers' meetings are being announced.

BARNS BURNED IN SOUTHWOLD

Those of Hugh Fulton on West River Road Go Up in Smoke.

Middlemarch, Sept. 21.—The fine barns of Hugh Fulton, on the west river road, Southwold, together with the season's crops, were totally destroyed by fire at one o'clock this morning. How the fire started is a mystery, but when discovered beyond control, and the fine buildings, which included two recently constructed bank barns and a couple of smaller structures, were reduced to ashes.

Mr. Fulton's loss will not fall short of \$3,000. The property was insured in the Southwold Mutual but despite this his loss will be a very severe one.

At the time of the fire Mr. Fulton was away in London.

MR. MONTEITH RETURNING

Minister of Agriculture Will Be Back Early in October.

Toronto, Sept. 21.—Hon. Nelson Monteith sails from England on the Victorian on Sept. 25 for home. The Minister of Agriculture will then have spent over a month in the land in connection with the opening of an Ontario office in London, and other new schemes for colonization and immigration.

After he gets back he will likely be able to announce his future plans. The latest story is that he is not to take charge of the London office, but is to get a seat and remain in the cabinet.

UNION OF JOCKEY CLUBS

Quebec and Ontario May Unite to Control Canadian Turf Matters.

Toronto, Sept. 21.—A meeting of the presidents of the Jockey clubs racing in Ontario and Quebec was held today in the directors' room at Woodbine Park. Mr. Seagram, president of the Ontario Jockey Club, was in the chair. There were also present: Judge Monck, vice-president of the Hamilton Jockey Club, in the absence of Senator Gibson; George M. Hendrie, president Windsor Jockey Club; Sir Montague Allan, president of the Montreal Jockey Club, and J. H. Madigan, president of the Niagara Jockey Club. The meeting was devoted to the discussion

of matters for the welfare of the Canadian turf. From this meeting will develop the Canadian Racing Association, which body will doubtless assume control of the turf in the Dominion. The gentlemen present were entirely of one accord as to the many benefits which would result from such a union. Many details were practically agreed upon, and the actual work of organization will be completed at a meeting to be held in the latter part of October, subsequent to the close of the racing season.

CHURCH CELEBRATION

St. John's, at Sandwich, Has Its 100th Anniversary.

Sandwich, Ont., Sept. 21.—In connection with its harvest home festival yesterday St. John's Anglican Church celebrated the 100th anniversary of the erection of the first church.

When the British evacuated Detroit and the northwest in 1796 several families loyal to the British crown moved from Detroit to the south side of the Detroit River, settling on the front between what is now Walkerville and a point a few miles below here. These families organized a parish, of which one of their number, Richard Pollard, who had been a deacon in Quebec, was planned in charge.

In 1807 the parish erected the first church building west of the Mohawk Valley. The building was destroyed by the American army in the Gen. Harrison invasion of 1813. A new church was put up in 1815, which was pulled down in 1872 to make way for the present building.

C. P. R. TO BUY ROAD

Chicago, Sept. 21.—A special dispatch to the Inter-Ocean from Minneapolis says that the Chicago Great Western Railroad Company, together with all of its terminal facilities, rolling stock and motive power, and equipment, will soon become the sole property of a subsidiary line to the vast system of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, seems to be a certainty, according to unofficial in-

formation from headquarters of the Great Western in St. Paul.

Montreal, Sept. 21.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy shown the Chicago and Great Western dispatch, said: "I haven't heard anything about it."

RUN DOWN BY TRAIN.

Toronto, Sept. 21.—An unknown man was run over and killed by a G. T. R. train near Maple this afternoon. The body, which was brought to the city and is now in the morgue, is that of a man of 60, poorly dressed, and evidently a tramp. He paid no attention to the warning whistle of the engine, and was struck and run over before the train could be stopped.
