Rebels Said to Have Sent WEEK FOR COMMITTEE Force Out to Keep Off Help to Besieged.

Juarez, April 1.-It is learned that General Monclovio Herrera, who has been ngaged in the fighting at Torreon, has been begun a march onward with the expectation of meeting Federal reinforcements marching on Torreon from Saltillo. At midnight, save for Herrera's departure, it was said the situation at Torreon proper was unchanged.

Juarez, April 1 .- Juarez waited today for definite news of General Villa's position in his attack on Torreon. Reports received by General Carranza last night indicated that fighting still was in progress. No idea was obtained as to when the relative positions of the rebels and Federals would change.

General Carranza today seemed confident that his military chieftain would conquer the Federals under General Refugio Velasco. The report that heavy reinforcements for the federal leader were approaching Torreon did not shake his

confidence. Both armies are said to be so worn and exhausted by continued fighting that the present action lacks the virility of the rebel conquest of Gomez Palacio.
