It is evident from the report of prisners and booty taken that the Austrians defended Kimpolung with coniderable forces. "Western front.—There has been intense artillery fire in many sectors in the regions of Jacobstadt and Dvinsk. "In the region east of Horodyshos north of Baranovichi, after a violent bombardment of our trenches near the Scroboff farm on Sunday night, the

enemy took the offensive, but was repulsed. At the same time on the road to Slutsk, the enemy attempted to approach our trenches on the Shara River, but was repulsed by our fire.
