

SOLDIERS' AID WOULD END DISTURBANCES

Want Control of "Child Welfare" To Be in City.

Members of the London branch of the Soldiers' Aid Commission approached the provincial department in Toronto Tuesday, asking that child welfare work in this city be placed under local control. The Toronto authorities promised the question would receive instant and careful consideration.

This action on the part of the London members comes as a climax following a long series of disturbances in the local commission during the past few months. Last spring L. E. Lowman was brought to the London department from Toronto and placed in charge of child welfare work. Previous to that date this enterprise was a "community" affair and handled solely by the local branch.

As time progressed many complaints of inefficiency were hurled at the department, and Mr. Lowman was severely censured by the Army and Navy Veterans, who at a general session recommended that the question of his appointment be taken up with the provincial department.

Those who attended the Toronto session were: Rev. H. B. Ashby, James Gray, George Conneland, Col. C. M. R. Graham and Edward Lauce, secretary of the London commission.

MANITOBA WHEAT CROP EXCEEDS LAST YEAR'S

Winnipeg, Oct. 26.—Manitoba's wheat crop for the past season totaled 45,125,000 bushels, or an average of 13.75 bushels to the acre, according to the provincial department of agriculture. This is an estimated increase of 10,583,000 bushels over the 1920 figures.

88 TAKE OUT LIQUOR LICENSES IN QUEBEC

Quebec, Oct. 26.—Under the provisions of the Quebec liquor act, which comes into effect here following the repeal of the Scott act, the Quebec Liquor Commission today issued permits for 7 hotel licenses, 29 tavern licenses, 8 restaurant licenses, 1 club license and 43 shop licenses.

EGYPTIANS WOULD END BRITISH PROTECTORATE

London, Oct. 26.—Abolition of the British protectorate in Egypt and substitution of a permanent treaty of alliance is provided for in a draft agreement which is the result of negotiations between the British Government and an Egyptian mission headed by Adly Yeghen Pasha, the Egyptian premier, which is now in London. The document is ready for signature.

PLAN HUGE BUILDING IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Oct. 26.—Plans for a new \$6,000,000 building to house the Chicago Board of Trade, replacing the present structure, built in 1884, were announced today.

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BRIAND LIKELY TO ASK RELIEF FROM HIS DUTIES

French Premier Will Demand a Vote Before Going to Washington Conference.

Paris, Oct. 26.—Premier Briand faced today a situation that seemed perilous to his ministry. Debate in the Chamber of Deputies on the government's domestic and foreign policies was to close, and a vote of confidence was to be taken.

There appeared to be a possibility that the opposition would have enough strength either to reject the vote of confidence or cut down the margin of the premier's victory to such an extent that he would feel it was a mandate against going to the Washington conference. In either event, it was deemed probable that Mr. Briand would ask President Millerand to relieve him of the duties of office.

In opening the debate in the chamber last week, the premier made it plain that he desired a vote of confidence which would be emphatic enough for him to go to Washington as the recognized spokesman of the French Government and parliament. Discussion of the policies followed by the administration relative to the Near East, German reparations, domestic questions and other matters of great importance at the present moment developed bitterness many times during the past few days, and culminated yesterday in an attack upon the government by Andre Tardieu.

Premier Briand yesterday refused to entertain proposals from Premier Goullet and Foreign Minister Balthazard of the possibility of the possibility of mediation between Greece and Turkey. It is asserted by newspapers here.

RETURNED SOLDIERS' BODY WILL ENTER CAMPAIGN

New Organization to Support "Reasonable Protective Tariff."

Toronto, Oct. 26.—Organization has been completed here of the National Service League of Returned Soldiers and others, which will "take an active part in the approaching election campaign." The league is pledged to support "a reasonable protective tariff." It is stated that this new organization is in any way to conflict with or supplant veteran organizations which are non-political, and right to be so.

Premier Meighen is expected to address a gathering of the local members of the new organization next Friday night.

STOLE GOOTSON'S LIQUOR; REMANDED FOR SENTENCE

Laho Lazwoko Pleads Guilty to Charge of Theft.

Laho Lazwoko, a Russian, pleaded guilty in police court Wednesday morning to stealing six quarts of whiskey from the cellar of Morris Gootson, whom the police term "the boss" of the city's Russian quarter. Gootson laid the information, but did not want the prisoner to receive heavy punishment.

Evidence showed that Lazwoko was intoxicated when he committed the theft. He was remanded until Tuesday for sentence. He stated that he did not break into the house, but that he just lifted a piece of tin which was covering a cellar window and crawled through the opening. Although a key to Gootson's house was found on him, the prisoner denied that he had used it to get in or out of the house.

No sooner was the case disposed of than Gootson was charged with allowing a horse to run at large. He pleaded not guilty. After the evidence was heard, the case was adjourned until Friday. Gootson left the court carrying the contents of the six quart bottles which had been emptied in a large jar by the thief. The plaintiff stated that nine quarts of whiskey had been stolen but considers himself lucky to have six of them returned to him.

BEER PERMITS ISSUED.

Washington, Oct. 26.—Issuance of permits to brewers for the manufacture of medical beer under the new treasury regulations will proceed with promptness and dispatch. Internal Revenue Commissioner Blair said today.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS IN ITALY.

Milan, Oct. 26.—Earthquake shocks were felt in the cities of Massa and Carrara, on the Tuscan coast of Italy, last night. Considerable damage was done and the frightened people of both cities camped during the night in open fields.

Lake Erie Gale Holds Up Ships At Welland Canal

ST. Catharines, Oct. 26.—For 24 hours all downbound traffic on the Welland Canal has been completely tied up because of a prevailing east wind on Lake Erie which has lowered the water in the canal to such an extent that boats with cargoes are unable to float over the sill at Lock No. 2. The steamer Brantford is held around at the Allenburg guardlock and is leaking.

SECRETARY ED. BERNARD of the London Motor Club announced on Monday that the Lambeth highway is now open to St. Thomas. Motorists making the trip will not have to make any more detours. Mr. Bernard stated that the London highway in the London diocese are gathered in the city today for a conference with Bishop Fallon. It is believed that educational matters, along with general subjects pertaining to the welfare of the diocese, will be up for consideration.

BUTCHER IN MONTREAL LOSES \$750 TO THUGS

Montreal, Oct. 26.—While Alime La Bousserie, butcher, Mount Royal avenue, was talking on the telephone in his store this morning two bandits entered, ordering him to throw up his hands at the point of revolvers, stole \$750 from his pockets and then threw him into the refrigerator. He was rescued, almost frozen to death, some hours afterwards.

WITNESS'S DEATH ENDS TRIAL.

Buffalo, N.Y., Oct. 26.—The indictment against William Jarvis of New York, charged with complicity in an alleged fake wire-tapping scheme through which Michael Connolly, late Montreal contractor, lost \$125,000, was dismissed in the supreme court yesterday. Connolly's death, which occurred about two months ago, was responsible for the dismissal of the indictment. He was the chief witness for the prosecution in the case, and without his testimony the case was unable to proceed with the trial.

BALTIMORE RIOTERS KILL ONE.

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 26.—A colored man was killed in a battle with Baltimore police at Humphrey station, a suburb of this city, late last night, following a threatened race riot. The riot was precipitated by an assault upon a white girl by a negro.

U. S. CONSUL STABBED.

Washington, Oct. 26.—Lloyd Burlingham, United States consul at Salina Cruz, Mexico, was assaulted and stabbed by unidentified assailants in the consulate last Monday night, according to advices today to the state department.

SECTION HANDS KILLED.

Swift Current, Sask., Oct. 26.—D. Houle and G. Duchesne, both from Quebec, while working as section hands on the Canadian Pacific Railway between Aitken and Waldeck, were struck by an engine yesterday afternoon and instantly killed.

DELAYING CHOICE OF SCHOOL ARCHITECT

Board of Education To Consider Enlargement of "Tech."

At a special meeting of the advisory vocational committee of the board of education to be held at 12:15 p.m. Thursday, the proposal to enlarge the London Technical and Art School will be further considered. Before any estimate can be provided as a guide for the 1922 board, it will be necessary to determine just which architect will prepare the specifications.

Following the wish of the committee at its last meeting, L. E. Carrothers, the school architect, has been approached to his ability to assist in the task. He declares that he is both willing and able to proceed. The majority of the trustees admit this, but feel that with the volume of work already outlined for the coming year, it would be necessary to hire additional help for Mr. Carrothers.

"This is a much-involved question," explained School Trustee Thomas Row, chairman of the committee, discussing the point Wednesday. "There is more than one angle to regard this matter from, and looking at it from the ratepayer's viewpoint, the question of expenditures must certainly not be overlooked."

The committee may decide not to employ additional help for the school architect, but may allow the architects who prepared the original plans of the entire school, to continue with the proposed auditorium.

JUSTICE MOWAT'S FIRST CASE WAS LIBEL ACTION

Woodstock Barrister Enters Suit For Damages Against Sentinel Review.

Woodstock, Oct. 26.—Justice H. M. Mowat of Toronto, the newly-appointed judge of the supreme court of Ontario, began his career as a supreme court judge when he conducted the fall assizes at Woodstock on Tuesday. He was the plaintiff in the libel action, which he had to try turned out to be one without a parallel in the legal history of the province. In the opinion of the court, the case was a libel action.

The case was that of libel action of Homer D. Neely, barrister of Woodstock, versus the Sentinel-Review Publishing Company, and the unique feature about the case was that not a single witness was brought forward to give evidence on either side. The case was entirely upon the plea of counsel to the jury. The presentation of the case hinged entirely upon the interpretation of points of law, and in the end the judge rendered a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, without damages, and a recommendation that the costs be paid by defendant.

The judge, however, intimated that his recommendation was beyond the power of the jury and that he alone had the right to determine which party would pay the costs, that he would give his decision on this point later.

Under an agreement with the unions changes in rates of pay are effective only when both sides are agreed that such a change is necessary to stimulate wages.

PRINCE OF WALES NOW ON WAY TO INDIA AND JAPAN

Some Anxiety Is Felt Concerning the British Heir's Safety During Trip.

London, Oct. 26.—The Prince of Wales left the Victoria station at noon today for Portsmouth to embark on the battle cruiser Renown for a tour of India and Japan. Great crowds outside the station greeted the prince with an enthusiastic send-off, while on the platform were King George, Queen Mary, Princess Mary, Prime Minister Lloyd George, several members of the British cabinet, United States Ambassador Harvey, Japanese Ambassador Hiroshi, and other distinguished personages.

The leave-taking of the royal family presented a touching scene. All of them were deeply moved. Princess Mary weeping quietly, while the King, with his arm over the prince's shoulder, was talking earnestly with him. After the prince departed, the other members of the royal family remained on the platform for a few minutes.

The Renown will land the prince at Bombay, in which city he will begin a series of formal functions arranged in every city he will visit. Following his progress through India, the prince will go to Japan, where he will return to the United Kingdom of Crown Prince Hirohito, who returned to Tokyo recently from a journey that took him to London, Paris and Rome.

Anxiety over the prince's journey has been caused by the troubled political conditions in India. The possibility of an attack on him is minimized here, but it is feared the Indian Nationalists, led by Mahatma Gandhi, may possibly attempt to carry out their threat to call strikes in every city visited by the party.

Prince Charles, second son of King Albert of Belgium, was last month appointed a midshipman on board the Renown during the voyage to the Orient.

GRAND TRUNK EMPLOYEE IS VICTIM OF ACCIDENT

J. Henry, 56 years old, 463 Maitland street, employed as a porter at the Grand Trunk Hotel, has been injured to bless the first aid work as instituted on the G. T. R. lines. Mr. Henry was at work Tuesday afternoon wheeling some iron pipe into one of the cars, heard then the whistle of the passing pipe fell on his left foot, crushing it severely.

George Bathgate, a comrade, who is proficient in first aid, immediately rendered the assistance, and dressing the injured member, had Mr. Henry removed to the office of Dr. Seaborn. Mr. Henry will be confined to his home for a week or more, it was stated at the freight sheds on Wednesday afternoon.

Two students from Michigan are the first to send in applications to attend the three months' short course in agriculture at Strathroy, under the direction of the Middlesex branch of the Ontario department of agriculture, which opens Nov. 28.

Baldwin Locomotive, Pressed Steel Car, Bethlehem, Crucible and United States Steel were higher by fractions to 2 points. Shipments also improved, but rails failed to shake off their recent anathema. Preliminary quotations for the principal foreign exchange rates were irregular, reflecting latest political developments abroad.

1:30 p.m.—The low-priced oils, sugars and leather issues forged ahead in the early afternoon, but rails declined 1 point, and other representative shares substantial fractions. A wide assortment of industrials and specialties ruled from 1 to 5 points higher, reflecting a decided increase in professional and public buying.

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Women of Britain to Wish Washington Delegates "God-Speed"

LONDON, Oct. 26.—A nationwide appeal for British women to demonstrate their support of the statesmen at the Washington disarmament conference is contained in a letter to the London Times signed by Lady Astor and Mrs. Margaret Wetheringham, members of Parliament and other prominent women.

On the supposition that the steamer carrying the delegates will sail Nov. 5, the letter suggests that on Nov. 3 every woman and every girl over 14 years of age send a signed post card bearing "God-speed" addressed to the prime minister or chief British delegate aboard the Aquitania at Liverpool.

TAXES FORCE DISHONESTY, DECLARES ENGLISH JUDGE

Burden of Taxation Subject of Striking Pronouncement.

London, Oct. 26.—Canadian Press Cable.—A striking pronouncement touching the burden of taxation emanated from Justice Darling in passing nominal sentence here today upon a dealer for an income tax misdemeanor.

"I am perfectly aware," he said, "that the taxations of this country, especially the direct taxation, has reached a point that is making it very difficult for a large number to remain honest."

A Marylebone magistrate, handling a batch of summonses for non-payment of local taxes, said: "We cannot sell these people's homes if they cannot pay." The town council might suggest that proceedings in such cases be taken for the amounts to be written off.

ITALIAN CITY THREATENED BY RAGING FOREST FIRE

Explosion of Powder Magazine Started by Conflagration.

London, Oct. 26.—The explosion of a powder magazine at Santa Elena fortress, reported from Avona, Italy, last night, was caused by extensive forest fires which have been raging for several days in the vicinity of Vada, on the west side of the Gulf of Genoa, according to advices to the Central News Agency from Rome today.

Despite the efforts of firefighters the forest conflagrations extended to a line of forts in that section. Only one of them had exploded, the dispatch said, but it wrecked several near-by houses and killed and injured many persons. Rescue parties hurried to Vada from neighboring towns. It was said yesterday an explosion occurred in the fortress and Bologna, more than 150 miles away.

MOVEMENT OF WHEAT INCREASES FOURFOLD

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—Total traffic through the Welland Canal in September this year increased 101,288 tons, or 30 per cent over September, 1920, due principally to increased grain shipments. Wheat shipments amounted to 143,903 tons, or 4,796,800 bushels, as against 32,569 tons or 1,065,600 bushels for September last year. Soft coal shipments through this canal showed a decrease of 134,246 tons for September of this year.

Total freight through the Welland Canal for September, 1921, was 436,612 tons, as against 335,241 tons in September, 1920.

MISSOURI MURDERER IS FOUND IN GUELPH

Guelph, Oct. 26.—A man named Walter Mullen, wanted by the police authorities of Carthage, Missouri, in connection with a murder in that place some time ago, has been located at the provincial reformatory here. He was sent to the reformatory, a short time ago from Peterboro. Mullen is sick, but an effort will be made to have him extradited. It is understood he was formerly a resident of Ottawa.

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
