St Thomas Civic Bodies Initiate Plan For 'Community Chest.'

COUNCIL SUPPORTS IDEA
Chamber of Commerce Formulates Scheme For One Big Campaign.

ST. THOMAS, March 31.—The first definite steps for the formation of a community chest in this city will probably be taken Friday night, April 7, when, at a special meeting

of representatives of all charitable institutions deriving money by public subscriptions, will be held, plans for the undertaking will be discussed.

A community chest for this city has been under consideration for some time. The scheme was first formulated by the chamber of commerce, and when a plan was worked out Secretary Harmer secured the interest of the city council. The special meeting was called by Mayor C. E. Raven.

If the idea meets with general favor one week each year will be set aside, when a huge drive for funds will be carried out under the direction of a special committee of businessmen. The money secured will then be divided among the different institutions which depend on the public for support. When an organization receives help in this way it will not be allowed to conduct an individual campaign at any time during the year. In this way the citizens will give once, and so be

Will Outline "Tech" Benefits

Inspector F. P. Gavin To Speak at St. Thomas Gathering.

PLAN NEW BUILDING

Dr. A. Voaden To Describe New Type of School Proposed.

ST. THOMAS, March 31.—F. P. Gavin of Toronto, inspector of technical schools for the department of education, will be one of the speakers at the forum meeting of the chamber of commerce to be held at the city hall Thursday evening, April 6. Mr. Gavin will come to this city as the result of a request for a speaker made to the department by Secretary J. R. Harmer of the local chamber.

Mr. Gavin has accepted an invitation from the local chamber to speak on the subject, "The Advantages of a Technical School in a City." No man in the province of Ontario is better versed in the work of schools of this type than Mr. Gavin, and so it is expected that his talk will prove of the utmost value to this city.

Dr. A. Voaden, principal of the Collegiate Institute, will tell of the dire need of more school accommodation for higher education in this city, and will explain the type of school the advisory committee of the board of education proposes to build.

The Alma College extension fund will be the subject of an address by Rev. Perry S. Dobson, principal of improvements that are to be made to that building, and of the means which will be used to raise the money.

A musical program will be given. Aid. Frank Lemon will act as chairman.

PRINCE'S VISIT IS BENEFICIAL

Happy Smile and Gracious Manner Have Won Through in Indian Empire.

IS RECEIVED IN CEYLON
Japan Preparing To Give Great Reception To British Heir-Apparent.

LONDON, April 1.—After having spent four months in India, practically every important section of which he visited, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, on March 17 once more embarked on the British battleship Renown, this time sailing for Japan, stopping on the way at the Island of Ceylon, in the Indian Ocean.

History will record the results of the prince's strenuous, and on the whole, pleasant tour through the various parts of the great empire of India, but at present there is a general British sigh of relief that his royal highness has carried out his mission in safety, and there is a general acknowledgment that his reception, which was really to convey a message of good will to the various peoples of that country, has had a beneficial effect. In short, the prince's happy smile, coupled with his gracious manner and his abilities as an all-round sportsman, have won through in India, as it has already done in other parts of the British Empire.

Reception at Colombo. Now the interest in this royal traveler shifts to Colombo, the capital of Ceylon, where arrangements have been made for a magnificent reception for the prince. Colombo has a population of 267,888, and the official residence of the governor of Ceylon, His Excellency Brig.-Gen. Sir William Henry Manning, is in that city. From Ceylon, the prince will sail for Japan. He is due to arrive at Yokohama on April 12, and he will go up to Tokyo. There he will be received with all the Oriental grace and attention characteristic of the Japanese, and doubtless his visit in Japan will be exceedingly pleasant, as well as interesting.

Among the entertainments arranged in honor of the Prince of Wales at Tokyo are dinner parties at the Japanese foreign office and at the prime minister's official residence, and a ball at the British embassy. At Yokohama, where the prince will stop a brief period before going to Tokyo, he will be the chief guest at a hall given by the British colony there.

Japanese Itinerary. The prince will travel to Nikko on April 19, and after spending two days he will return to Tokyo for one night. Then he will proceed to Odawara and Lake Hakone, visiting Yokohama on the way to unveil an inter-allied war memorial arch, which has been erected on the Yokohama "Bluff" by public subscription. After a short stay at Lake Hakone, the prince will leave by motor car for Shoji, where he will remain over night and continue on the following day to Lida. From Lida, he will the next day descend the Tenryukawa Rapids as far as the railway line, where he will take train to Hikone, on Lake Biwa, for Kyoto. He will devote a week to Kyoto, during which time he will visit Lake Biwa and its island of Chikubushima.

After Kyoto, two days are allotted to Nara, the old capital of Japan, and his royal highness will then proceed to Kobe. A ball will be given at Kobe by the British colony there. From Kobe he will sail on May 3 and traverse the Inland Sea, possibly calling at the sacred island Miyajima, to Kagoshima, in Kyushu.

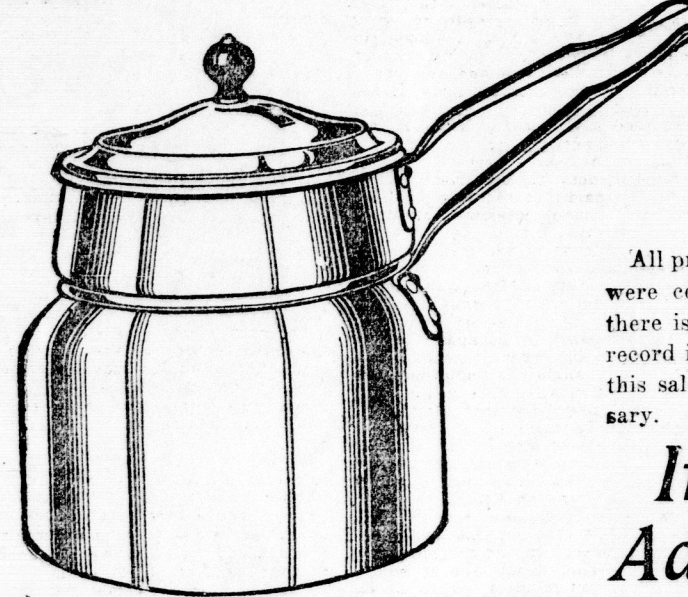
On May 9 the Renown will leave Japan with the prince on board and proceed to Manila in the Philippines, where his royal highness is to spend

WINDSOR WITHOUT LIGHT.

Windsor, March 31.—The border cities were lighted by candle and kerosene tonight, and faced the prospect of general unemployment on Saturday. The three cables of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission which deliver Niagara power were down and industrial heads said the possibility was that their companies would have to shut down for three or four days. A force of 200 men was at work at Blenheim, March 31.—The rain and

day on temporary lines to give light to domestic consumers, but at 6 o'clock the work was unfinished. Some business places have auxiliary steam plants, but they are of limited capacity. Before grocery stores closed at 6 o'clock all stocks of kerosene and candles were exhausted.

MICHIGAN SUFFERS.

Detroit, March 31.—Lower Michigan today was under a blanket of snow and ice; communication lines were crippled; many highways were impassable, with telephone poles and wires blocking traffic, and interurban railway service was greatly hampered by the ice-covered rails and interruption of power transmission lines. The glass covered the southern half of the lower peninsula, while in the north, which was all but cut off from wire communication, a heavy snowfall was reported. Officials of the Michigan State Telephone Company said today that damage to its equipment would amount to \$1,500,000; the Detroit United Railway placed its loss at \$10,000, and the Western Union and Postal Telegraph companies also sustained heavy damage.

Farmers also will be hard hit, according to reports reaching here, which state that many small trees had broken under the weight of ice.

St. Thomas, March 31.—It is doubtful whether this district was ever hit as hard by a storm as it was Thursday and Friday, when freezing rain and sleet, accompanied by a fairly high wind, completely isolated St. Thomas and Elgin County, and wrecked havoc with trees, poles and wires. The city was without power from Thursday afternoon until Friday midnight, when it was still in total darkness. Telephone service to points outside and parts of the city was crippled, while telegraph service was badly

tangled. The roads leading from the city were blocked by a tangle of wires and poles which had been pulled down by tons of ice. The city streets were strewn until they were almost impassable at spots with limbs and fallen trees. Although the steam roads kept fairly well to scheduled time, the electric road to London was completely stalled Thursday night and Friday from a lack of power. The city was cut off from hydro, when several breaks occurred in the high tension wires between here and London. Damages from Hamilton worked backward from Thursday night and Friday, but when it was doubtful if the Flower City would be lighted at any time Friday night.

In all directions from the city phone wires were strewn over the roads. Between this city and Union, a distance of only a few miles, seventeen telephone poles flat on the ground, and other hanging at dangerous angles stopped traffic.

Hundreds of shade trees within the city limits were completely spoiled. Broken tops which had become laid with ice. Few trees escaped damage as everywhere broken limbs were strewn about the ground. Throughout the afternoon the emergency squads of the hydro commission were kept busy propping up poles and towers.
