

J. D. CUMMING AND RECHNITZER LOSE

Rennie Wins Sensational Clash With Crocker of McGill.

TORONTO, July 13.—No finer exhibition of tennis has been seen here than that in which LeRoy Rennie of Toronto won from W. Crocker of McGill University, after a game in which both contestants played at top form. There was a very large gallery present and the match was a series of exciting rallies. The first set was the longest of the three, the score going to 6-4 before Rennie broke through and won the next two games. The second set was a close one, Rennie leading with tremendous force and accuracy and made several net recoveries. Rennie seemed dazed by the speed of the Montrealer and lost the set 6-4. In the third set Crocker won the first game and it looked as though he was going to repeat. At this point, however, Rennie started to put more speed on his stroke which baffled Crocker and made him miss some of his returns.

Bud Thomas of Ottawa showed that he is a very gritty player when he pulled his match with E. V. Rechinizer of London out of the fire with the score 1-2 and 4-5. Rennie, who had the stroke, but he seemed to lack the punch to finish off the match.

Frank Anderson of New York carried too many guns for J. D. Cumming of Windsor, although the latter put up a good game and won four games in each set.

79 PLAYERS ENTER OPEN GOLF FINALS

Robert McDonald Leads Field of Twenty-Four With Score of 143.

Ill., July 13.—The qualifying rounds in the national open golf tournament ended tonight and tomorrow seventy-nine players, many of them champions and all survivors of a field representing most of the golfing nations in the world, will start the seventy-two-hole finals for the American open championship.

Twenty-four men won their way into the finals in today's qualifying round, Robert McDonald, the long-driving Chicago professional, leading the field with a score of 72-71—143. The score necessary to qualify was 152. All of the better known stars qualified except A. A. Armour, Scottish amateur and holder of the Fred McLeod trophy.

2 MEN KILLED AS ROOF OF SKYSCRAPER COLLAPSES

PHILADELPHIA, July 13.—Two workmen were killed and nearly a score injured today, when the roof and part of the south wall of the 11-story City Center Building at Broad and Cherry streets, in the central business section, collapsed, hurling tons of bricks, mortar and girders into the street and onto the roofs of nearby buildings.

No reason has been assigned definitely for the cause of the accident, but it is believed that the wall of the upper story did not have proper girder supports. The building was being remodeled.

INGERSOLL MAY PROTEST TO O.A.L.A.

INGERSOLL, July 13.—The treatment accorded Ingersoll lacrosse players in St. Thomas on Wednesday has created keen indignation here, and it is expected that formal charges will be placed before the O. A. L. A., with the demand by the management of the local club for a full investigation.

What is claimed was the most glaring exhibition of rowdy tactics was when Hiltz of the Saints, who knocked out Murphy with his stick, attacked him when he was helpless on the field and struck him in the face and kicked him.
