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QUALITY OF LAWS NO DISADVANTAGE,

Hon. Mr. Justice Renfret
Speaks at Convention of
Bar Association.

Winnipeg, Aug. 27.—At the conclusion of a long-drawn-out afternoon session of the annual convention of the Canadian bar association today, Hon. Mr. Justice Renfret of the supreme court of Canada, delivered an inspiring address, the keynote of which was Canadian national unity.

Justice Renfret traced the mutual growth and interweaving of French and English laws in Canada. "There is no disadvantage in this quality of laws in the Dominion," he said. "We should have faith in the co-operation of the Canadian branches of the two great races to whom Providence has committed the destinies of this country. One and all, we are the servants of the law—the foundation of justice."

John E. Read, dean of Dalhousie law school, in an address on Canadian, American and English methods of legal education, warned that legal education should not be considered by itself. High ideal and Canadian patriotism should be exalted.

He presented the report of the committee on legal education which recommended that the preliminary education essentials should not be lower than the second year of the B.A. university course. The committee reported that four provinces, Manitoba, Nova Scotia, Alberta and New Brunswick had adopted this standard. It was further reported that the dean of Osgoode law school had recommended the new standard. The hope was expressed that Ontario would adopt the two-year standard during the coming year.

In the discussion which followed the fear was expressed from the floor of the convention that a standard might be adopted which would exclude Abraham Lincoln.

FATALLY MAULED BY DOGS IN NORTH

15 Crazy Huskies Attack Lone
Woman at R. C. M. P.
Post.

The Pas, Man., Aug. 27.—Details of the death of Mrs. Clay, wife of Sgt. S. G. Clay of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Chesterfield Inlet several months ago, were given today by Constable J. Stalworthy, who arrived here with a party from the Far North. Mrs. Clay died of injuries when attacked by 15 vicious huskies.

It was Constable Stalworthy and Corp. K. Penny, who beat off the dogs that attacked Mrs. Clay. Constable Stalworthy heard the screams of a woman and the howls of the dogs, and rushing out of the kitchen of the detachment barracks, saw Mrs. Clay stretched on the ground and the animals tearing at her. He and Corp. Penny grabbed heavy sticks and clubbed the dogs off Mrs. Clay. She was still alive, but her right leg from the knee down had been stripped of its flesh.

Knowing there was only one chance to save her life, Mrs. Clay consented to having her leg amputated above the knee. Infection, however, set in, and Mrs. Clay succumbed. Sgt. Clay has been in various parts of the Arctic for 20 years. There were no children.

The dogs which attacked Mrs. Clay were immediately shot.

TORONTO FAVORS NAMING OF GABY

Chief Engineer of Hydro-Electric Commission Prominently
Mentioned.

Opinion in provincial government circles in Toronto appears to favor the appointment of F. A. Gaby, chief engineer of the Ontario Hydro-Electric commission, as general manager of the commission, according to Philip Pocock, who was in Toronto on Wednesday of this week in connection with the proposed endowment fund for Byron Sanatorium as a memorial to the late Sir Adam Beck.

The re-organization of the commission to permit the appointment of a general manager commends itself to officials of the commission as the best way to fill the gap caused by the death of Sir Adam, who was in effect both chairman and general manager of the commission.

W. W. Pope, secretary of the commission, and Ex-Mayor C. A. Maguire, president of the Ontario Municipalities Electrical association, both expressed the opinion to Mr. Pocock that some such arrangement offered the best means of carrying on the work of the commission, and spoke highly of Mr. Gaby's qualifications for the position.

The appointment of a chairman is still in abeyance, and is causing much speculation. Belief that Premier Ferguson will be appointed to the chairmanship is on the wane to some extent. Mr. Maguire is the usual choice of the Ontario municipalities for this important post, while attorney-general F. W. Nickle is also prominently mentioned for a place on the commission.

ALIENS FORGOTTEN IN MONTREAL JAIL

Lawyer Charges Foreigners Left
Behind Bars After Terms
Expire.

Montreal, Aug. 27.—Charging that many men are held without warrant in Bordeaux jail, A. H. Tanner, local lawyer, took out a writ of Habeas corpus against Governor Seguin of the Montreal prison this morning. Mr. Tanner has already taken out several similar writs. Most of his complaints arise out of conflicting provisions of the immigration act.

The lawyer states that alien convicts subject to deportation under the law, are held in Bordeaux jail under orders from various Ottawa departments which enjoin the governor to turn the prisoner over to certain persons to be indicated by the department of immigration. These persons, avers Mr. Tanner, are never named, and the case is eventually lost sight of. In the meantime, the prisoner, after expurgating his sentence, languishes in jail for months, perhaps years, before someone brings their plight before the authorities.

CAILLAUX LAUDED FOR DEBT EFFORT

French Finance Minister Highly
Praised by Col-
leagues.

Paris, Aug. 27.—M. Caillaux, the French minister of finance, set forth at great length the result of his conference at London to his colleagues at a cabinet meeting tonight. He had reached a tentative settlement with the British chancellor of the exchequer, Winston Churchill, on France's debt to Great Britain—outstanding since the efforts of the French government to bring together the French and English viewpoints.

At the conclusion of his statement he pleaded fatigue, and asked to be excused. Before he left, Premier Painleve, on behalf of the cabinet, thanked M. Caillaux for the efforts he had made in bringing together the French and English viewpoints.

Submerging of Earth by Sea Is Saved by Opposition Quake Claim of Toronto Professor

Sees New Civilization Occupying
Polar Regions Under
Genial Climate.

London, Aug. 27.—A startling view of the future of mankind was expressed by Professor W. A. Parks of the University of Toronto, addressing the geological section of the British Association for the Advancement of Science today.

Professor Parks said that earthquakes were really a blessing in disguise, for, if the earth's crust were rigid enough to resist earthquakes, a universal deluge, geographically speaking, would be within sight, as the power of erosion is great enough to reduce the land to sea level but for the opposing rejuvenating forces.

Professor Parks was confident that there was no limit to the upward tendency of life. He said that the future variation in climate would probably greatly affect human activities, and that a new civilization would occupy the polar regions under a genial climate.
