The finest specimen of orce ever broughs down from the Silver King mine weighs 41 pounds, and shows peacock copper, grey copper, and brittle antimonial silver, chips from the apecimen assaying all the way from \$785 to \$10,800, the average being \$2,040. The tunnel is in 20 feet beyond the drift, and still in solid orce. Double, shifts are now working eo both shaft and tunnel, and the day is not far distant when British Columbia will boast of having the richest silver-copper mine on earth.

A PRACTICABLE PASS REPORTED FOUND.

The Canadian Pacific people are making an effort to find a practicable pass through the mountains on the west side of the Columbia river, to enable them to extend the Columbia & Kootenay from Sproat to a connection with the Shuswap & Okanagom. The exploring party is in charge of Mr. Duchesnay, and it is reported that a feasible rouse has alseady been discovered, although it will require an expensive tunnel. It is also reported that Mr. Duchesnay has discovered that which many another engineer has failed to discover, that is, a feasible route over Hope mountain. If these reports are correct, within five years the main line of the Canadian Pacific will be 150 miles south of the present line, and through the best portion of the province, instead of the poorest.
