...New Haven, Conn., May 29.—The machinists employed in the works of Sargent & Co., who have been on strike for ten days, to enforce the demand for a nine-hour day, went back to work, the company having acceded to their demands; 65 machinists are employed in the shop. Fort Wayne, Ind., May 28.—All the machinists and helpers in the boiler, foundry and machine works, one of the largest plants in the country devoted to the manufacture of car wheels, struck today for nine hours. The strikers number 150.

...London, May 29.—At Willesden, an outlying suburb of London, a man supposed to be suffering from the British form of bubonic plague, has been discovered. Persons with whom he had come in contact were detained, but have now been released. The patient himself is still under observation. Philadelphia, May 27.—The Presbyterian general assembly adopted the revision committee report today. Dr. Moffat moved the following amendment: "We recommend that this committee be instructed to prepare and to submit to the next general assembly for such disposition as may be judged wise, a brief statement of the reformed faith expressed as far as possible in untechnical terms. The said statement is to be prepared with a view to its being employed to give information and a better understanding of our doctrinal beliefs and not with a view to its becoming a substitute for or an alternative of our confession of faith." "We further recommend that this committee be instructed to prepare a revision of chapter III, section X, section 3, chapter XVII, section 7, chapter XXII, section 5 and chapter XXV, section 6 of our confession of faith, either by modification of the text or by declaratory statement, but so far as possible by declaratory statement so as more clearly to express the mind of the church with additional statements concerning the love of God for all men, missions and the Holy Spirit as a member of the church." The amendment was adopted by a viva voce vote, not one voice being in opposition to it. The question was then on the adoption of the report, and Dr. Johnson moved that three recommendations contained in the report be adopted, to wit: That the majority of the revision committee be authorized to carry out the report as a whole. Then the moderator said that there was one great point of difference between the report and the confession of faith, and that was the question of the Holy Spirit as a member of the church. The moderator then led in prayer. The end of the great discussion, which had continued into the fourth day, came quickly and it took everyone by surprise. Dr. Baker offered a resolution that the present
