WIDESPREAD DESOLATION AT BAY CITY

High Wind Drives Flames Around the Waterfront From North Beach.

Since the accompanying map of the fire area in San Francisco was made the flames have completed the destruction of both sides of Van Ness avenue, the grand residential thorougufare running north and south, but as to how far westward the flames succeeded in eating their way is not definitely stated. At all events their progress towards the ocean beyond this avenue in what is called the Western Addition, has been checked. On the harbor or eastern side of Van Ness avenue all the way to the water front at North Beach, at the top of the map, the conflagration has made a clean sweep. The gale which is a feature of San Francisco's climate conditions during the afternoons, was reported Friday night to have turned the progress of the flames and had neaded it into portions of the district between North Beach and the harbor front that hitherto escaped the conflagration. fire area in San Francisco was made

On Nob Hill (marked on the map) was situated the Mark Hopkins Institute of Art, a cut of which appears elsewhere in this edition. At latest accounts the flames were making their may along the water front towards the Ferry buildings at the foot of Market street, but that they are under control and the danger of their reaching these buildings was not very great. 
