ROCKS AHEAD

Our civic fathers in a few weeks will have an anxious time in the matter of enforcing the By-Laws especially the clauses relating to Fire District No. 1. It will be remembered that the applications of the various churches for the changing of the By-Laws to allow exemption from the provisions of the clauses governing buildings was in the cases of the Presbyterian and Baptist bodies turned down flat. The council stated in emphatic terms that the By-Laws must be enforced. These same By-Laws arrange for the removal of all shacks on Fire District No. 1 by the 31st of December of this year. This clause will effect all buildings which are not of standard fire proof construction as provided for in the By-Laws, and as it is not just nor in reason to make flesh of one and fish of another, there are a certain number of citizens who will see that the requirements of the By-Laws are carried out and that without par or favour. It has been stated openly and often that the council will not insist on the removal of these shacks on the prescribed date but it would be well to note the following facts; first that the OWNERS of such shacks or temporary buildings or buildings contrary to the building law of this fire district, took upon themselves the obligation to remove such shacks or buildings on a prescribed date, to wit the 31st Dec., 1911, or to make such buildings conform to said By-Law and second, the council when sworn in took upon themselves the obligation to serve the citizens to the best of their ability and to see that the By-Laws governing the town were administered in an impartial manner. It now remains therefore with both owners and council to observe their obligations, and as already stated if the council insist on a certain portion of the people observing all the provisions of the By-Laws, they must see that all are put in the same position.

The census department have given out the official figures for the town of Campbellton taken at last census as 3813. Just previous to the fire the estimated population was nearly 4000, and in 1905 a census taken by enumerators appointed by the Town Council gave the population as 3745.

We can congratulate ourselves that even with such a disaster as did overtake us in July 1910 we have not fallen very far back, and we have the confident feeling that our town will yet occupy a higher plane than it has done in the past.
