RADICALISM. A Lecture by Mr. B. F. Underwood-The Different

Kinds of Radicals.

The Monument of Major Andre Defaced by an Unknown Man-An American Flag. The spot where Major Andre was hanged as a British apy in 1780 is marked by a Real Estate Offices - Houses Wanted - A Hint | great block of gray granite, erected by Cyrus W. Field of New York, at the village

Here died, Oct. 2, 1780, Major John Andre of the British army, who entered the American lines on a secret mission to Benedict Arnold, was taken prisoner, tried and condemned as a spy! His death, though according to the stern code of the law, moved even his enemies to pity, and both armies mourned the fate of one so young and so brave. In 1821 his remains were removed to Westminster Abbey. A hundred years after his execution this stone was placed above the spot where he lay by a citizen of the state against which he fought, not to perpetuate the record of strife, but in token of these better feelings which have since united two nations, one in race, in language and in religion, with the earnest hope that this friendly union will never be broken.


