Dairy and the engineer, A S Currie and Miett, the wheelsman, leaving the canal about 10 a.m. At 3.30 the boat—towing a scow—reached Perry's sawmill at Waiska's bay, and after shipping a pile driver and other materials, the party left as 6 p.m. for the north shore. LEFT US HELPLESS.

We threw out the ancher but the cable was too short and we drifted before a stiff mortheast wind into Lake Superior, heading the boat for White Fish point.
