

EARLY START ON BUILDING URGED

Committee to Wait on Stratford Civic Bodies
RESULT OF CONFERENCE
Ald. Waugh Reports on Unemployment Situation

STRATFORD, Feb. 10.—A conference on unemployment and relief was held at the Chamber of Commerce to-night, with representatives present from the Chamber, Trades and Labor Council, City Council, Retail Merchants' Association and the public in general. Dr. Silcox presided.

Ald. Waugh, chairman of the City Council relief committee, presented a report on the situation, stating that two large sewers and all possible civil works had been undertaken and about 100 unemployed names are on the relief list at the city hall.

Reports were made by representatives of other organizations and the meeting passed a resolution pleading co-operation of all these bodies with the Council committees, General Aid Society and G. W. V. A. in carrying out necessary relief work.

Conditions were fully discussed and a committee named to wait upon the City Council, school board, hospital board and other relief committees building this year, to urge commencing as early as possible. The committee comprises Edmund King, president of the Trades Council; A. Kitchener, president of the Merchants' Association; F. Service, of the G. W. V. A.; and F. W. Trevel, Chamber of Commerce.

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URGES SENATE TO RATIFY PACTS

Harding Says New Treaties Will Help Understanding.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—The treaties negotiated during the Washington conference were laid before the Senate by President Harding today with request that they be ratified as guarantees of peace.

Appearing in person before the Senate the president declared that the new agreements would "serve to put an end to contradictions, to remove ambiguities and to establish clear understandings."

Seven treaties were submitted by the president. The first was the five-power naval armament treaty, the second the submarine and poison gas treaty, the third the four-power Pacific treaty, the fourth and fifth were supplementary treaties to the four-power Pacific pact and the other related respectively to the general Far Eastern situation and to Chinese affairs.

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FIVE-FOOT STILL IN WOOLWICH FARMHOUSE

Licence Officers Find Outfit Concealed in Dugout Under Summer Kitchen.
KITCHENER, Feb. 10.—A copper still, some five feet across and the same in height, firmly fixed in a brick work mounting, and carefully concealed in a well-planned dugout under the summer kitchen of a farmhouse on the Bloomingdale-Nepean road, was found by licence officers today.

The owner of the house at first denied the presence of any still, but on being pressed further he admitted having it and led the officers down the stairway to the dugout. Later he and his son got busy and broke down the brick work that the officers might take away the still. The case will be heard next week.

ACTION FOR HIGH COURT
Town Owned Machinery and Paid the Rent

INGERSOLL, Feb. 10.—A writ was issued this afternoon by Ex-Ald. William A. Sutherland against the corporation for what he alleges to be illegal entry to his premises on Thames street. The building, owned by Ald. Sutherland, was formerly occupied by the Griffin Shoe Company. The company failed and under the terms of the mortgage and the machinery and certain portion could be sold before the high court at Woodstock. Mr. Sutherland contends that the action was illegal because the building had been let to a key, and when this was not given over they had a right to force entry. The matter will come before the high court at Woodstock.

HEDLEY STORE AND HOME BURNED AT CLARKSBURG

CLARKSBURG, Feb. 10.—The hardware store and dwelling at Clarksburg was totally destroyed by fire this morning about 7.30. The fire is believed to have ignited from the kitchen range, and spread to the store in the same building. The stock is almost a complete loss and only a few articles of furniture were saved. The loss is estimated at about \$10,000, partly covered by insurance. The waterworks system saved the buildings near. So hot was the fire that the Bell Telephone cable in front of the store was melted and practically the whole village and surrounding country are without telephone service.
