Making the Little ‡ Farm Pay

By C. C. BOWSFIELD

As land increases in value farms decrease in size. The average farm will soon be less than a hundred acres. Men and women are getting the vision of ten, twenty, and forty-acre tracts so handled as to yield a sufficient income for family mainten-

When farmers learn to cut out the waste and to secure larger returns from various articles which at present are regarded as being of little account agriculture will reach a more profitable basis. A correct principle profitable basis. A correct principle in conducting any place, large or small, is to have each interest prominent enough so that it will receive proper attention. If it is an orchard, a vineyard, a poultry yard, a pigeon loft or a variety of such things aim to make each product pay a definite amount. Let there be enough to it so that it can have a reasonable amount of time and attention.

Housewives have a full share of responsibility in this particular. They should be able to prevent all kinds of truit and vegetables going to waste by methods of canning and preserv-ing. On some farms enough prevent-able wastes occur almost every year

of late years efforts have been made to prevent grape juice ferment-ing and to preserve it in vessels of ing and to preserve it in vessels of such size and shape as can easily be transported, thus rendering its use possible at all times of the year. Until recently its use has been almost exclusively restricted to medi-cinal or sacramental purposes. Unrestricted and general use has been retarded through lack of knowledge of the principles underlying the pro-cess of manufacture. This lack of knowledge and of the necessary skill in applying it has resulted in many failures, thus rendering the production of a good article uncertain and

Use only clean, well ripened, but not overripe grapes. After the grapes have been picked wash and place in an aluminum or porcelain lined kettle, cover with boiling water and cook will some the cover with boiling water and cook will some the sould will some the soul until soft, so the seeds will separate readily from the pulp, mash with a wire potato masher and place in a jelly bag to drain. Do not squeeze the juice out, but hang on a nail to drain. If you wish to get as much as possible from your fruit, after most of the juice has drained from the pulp, it can be put through a sieve and the seeds and skins removed from the pulp. Sugar can then be added and all cooked until thick, and thei makes an excellent marma-

Place the clear juice in a kettle, add about a cupful of sugar to each quart of juice. Some tastes like it quart of juice. Some tastes like it sweeter than others, and if the grapes are very ripe it will require less sugar than when they first ripen. Bring quickly to the boiling point, skim, and put immediately in sterilized and being composite [1], the ized cans, being careful to fill the cans slowly at first and shake the hot juice up on to the sides, as the cans break much more readily than with canned fruit. Seal quickly, and you

will seldom have a can work or mold.

A serious mistake is sometimes made by putting the juice into bottles so large that much of it becomes spoiled before it is used after the bottles are opened. Unfermented grape juice properly made and botstate will keep indefinitely if it is not exposed to the atmosphere or mold germs, but when a bottle is once opened it should, like canned goods, be used as soon as possible to keep it from spoiling.
