#### OF PASSING INTEREST

Only four passengers were killed on the Canadian railways last year, out of a total of fifty one millions carried.

During the last four months that the agricultural development board has been functioning, the province has lent to farmers in long term loans more than half a million dol-lars—to be exact \$571,579, in addition it has advanced \$25,000 in shor term loans.
