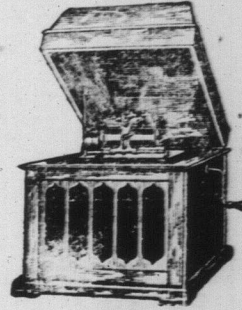
WEST PARADISE
