## MARINE NEWS

The tern schooner Stewart T. Salter is loading lumber at the port for J. Newton Pugsley for New Haven.

The Annapolis Royal schooner A. W. Longmire, Captain Longmire, at Pubnico, Thursday, hauled for 21,000 pounds of fresh halibut and 4,000 shuck.

The three top mast schooner Westway, Capt. Brooks, arrived at Belliveau's Cove on Friday after a 23-hour run from Boston. On the trip from Weymouth to Boston, the time was only 24 hours. The schooner is being loaded at the Cove.

Wooden ships are reported to be practically unsalable in Europe, where the wooden steamer Ethel, which originally cost \$500,000 to build, was recently sold in Cardiff, Wales, for \$4225. This vessel was built in Canada in 1919 and is said to have made five voyages, with only one trip across the Atlantic.

Henry A. Amro's schooner Annie L. Spindler, Captain William Snow, also previously reported, stocked on the fare of fish landed for her owner \$4,400 and her crew shared \$94.40 per man. Thursday the schooner had some repairs effected about her rigging, a new bobstay put in and she sailed from Yarmouth Friday morning for the banks.

The Yarmouth Trading Company's schooner Lucille M., Captain Andrew D'Eon, previously reported, stocked \$2,500 on the fare of fish sold to Austin E. Nickerson, Limited, and the crew shared \$100 per man. On her last trip the schooner lost her propeller and Thursday she was hauled up in her owner's dock at Yarmouth South to receive a new propeller.

A bill is reported to have been presented to the Italian chamber of deputies, calling for a sub-sidy to be allowed shipbuilders whose ships have been put into commission since July 1st, 1919, and before December 31st, 1922. According to the bill, ships must belong to Italian citizens, or to companies constituted in Italy, with Italians sitting on the boards of directors and the boats must be kept up for five years from the date of granting the certificate.

The staffs of the Montreal shipping companies have now got a great pressure of business in the preparation of the winter cruises planned for next January and February to the West Indies, Mediterranean and Egypt. There are twice as many cruises arranged for as last year and there is an appreciable cut in the cabin rates. In addition to the White Star liner Megantic there is the Canadian Pacific Empress of Britain, running to the West Indies.

The average size of vessels being built on the Clyde is now much smaller than it was in most years before the war. There are now no really large vessels in course of construction. On the other hand, construction is mostly devoted to intermediate liners and cargo steamers of fair size, while of late there has been a perceptible increase in activity in the building of small, motor-propelled vessels, barges for shipment abroad, and light craft generally. Except for the lack of large fast liners, however, there is now about as much variety in the work of the Clyde as there was before the war.
