Birds, &c, however, derives much of his in-
formation on these subjects from the Or-
nithological writings of Wilson, & John Rich-
ardson, the latter, author had personally
travelling in the Hudson Bay territo-
ry and the Arctic regions, and of it is
therefore among the first of Canadian
Ornithologists, though the Gr. of Audubon
himself passed some time in the
provinces, and visited Labrador, and
Newfoundland.

Besides those above named writers on
Canadian birds, we are able to remem-
ber that the avifauna of Canada was more
or less described in the writings of
Linnæus of Sweden, Blumenbach,
and Cuvier and Vieillot of France, Vig-
or, Swanson, Temminck, Agassiz,
and Gould. In his articles on Can-
adian birds, Mr. Billings, after ap-
pearing on the technical terms of Ornitho-
logy, writes on the Robin, the Black, and Snow
Quail, the Green, and Blue-winged Teal,
the Mallard Duck, and the Herring Gull,
the Wild Pigeon, and the different spe-
cies of Canadian Woodpeckers, the
Bobolink, the Quail, the ruffed Grouse,
and the Sp. of the partridge, the Snipe
the Woodcock, and the Great Horned
and Snowy Owls, and there is also in
the same volume an article by Mr.
McMahon, on the Bohemian Warbling.
