

Speculation is dead, save that people who have stocks on hand seem inclined to hold on to them as the cheapness of money enables them to "carry" without loss, save whatever may arise from a fall; and of the relative chances of a rise and a fall different opinions prevail. Montreal has been in demand and sold at 190 and 1901. Ontario has been quiet and after bringing 107 and 108 on Friday, closed without bids. Toronto quiet and steady. Commerce has sold steadily and varied very partially. Imperial seems to have been less in demand and has gone of at 124 and $12\frac{3}{4}$, closing without bids. Federal has been slightly easier.
