Question of Privilege

Mr. Speaker: I am sorry to interrupt the hon. member, but we are discussing a point of privilege. .

Mr. Diefenbaker: No, Mr. Speaker. On a question of order, the minister made gratuitous remarks-

Mr. McIlraith: To you.

Mr. Diefenbaker: -and the former minister of transport has the right to reply.

Mr. Speaker: I appreciate the comments of the right hon. L'eader of the Opposition, but this point of privilege has almost developed into a debate on both sides of the house. It is my duty to try to bring it to a conclusion and reach a decision as to whether the motion is in order. I think the extended discussion this morning almost proves the point that we are anticipating a grievance or a debate. For example, citation 113 in Beauchesne's fourth edition says:

Members often raise so-called "questions of privilege" on matters which should be dealt with as personal explanations or corrections, either in the debates or the proceedings of the house. A question of privilege ought rarely to come up in parliament. It should be dealt with by a motion giving the house power to impose a reparation or apply a remedy.

Well, we have a motion in front of us, which I am glad to say is the customary procedure, and I wish it were followed more often. But it has to be decided whether this motion is in order. In my opinion the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre could easily put a notice on the order paper asking for the production of papers. At that time the government could make up its mind whether to accede or not. In the light of these circumstances, and in the light of the extended discussion this morning, I regret to say I do not see a prima facie question of privilege on this matter.

Mr. Knowles: With respect, Mr. Speaker-I know I cannot argue at this point-but in view of what has been done to parliament in this matter, I must appeal your decision.

Mr. Speaker: The house has heard the decision of the Chair from which the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre has appealed to the house. All those in favour of sustaining the decision of the Chair will please say yea.

Some hon. Members: Yea.

Mr. Speaker: Those opposed will please say nay.

Some hon. Members: Nay.

Mr. Speaker: In my opinion the yeas have it.

And more than five members having risen:

Mr. Speaker: Call in the members.

[Mr. Balcer.]

Mr. Speaker put the question as follows: The question before the house is an appeal from a ruling of the Chair, which is as follows:

The hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre rose

on a question of privilege and proposed a motion

as follows:

Armstrong

'That in the opinion of this house the government should give immediate consideration to the question of making public the contents of the report of R. Dixon-Speas and Associates on the economic

operations of Trans-Canada Air Lines."

I stated that in my opinion the hon, member could put a motion on the order paper in order to permit the house to take a decision on the question. That being so, I ruled that there was not a prima facie question of privilege in regard to the proposed motion; whereupon the hon, member for Winnipeg North Centre appealed to the house from this decision.

The house divided on the question: Shall the Speaker's decision be sustained? And the decision of the Chair was sustained on the following division:
