Mr. Hees: As a supplementary question, in view of the fact that this matter is being considered would the Prime Minister assure the house that the decision will be made on the basis of the man's qualifications, rather than political patronage?

Mr. Speaker: That question is argumentative.

Mr. Thomas M. Bell (Saint John-Lancaster): As a further supplementary question, would the Prime Minister give a firm assurance that there will not be a division of the responsibilities formerly carried out by the president of Air Canada?

Mr. Trudeau: No, Mr. Speaker. It is possible that we will want to consider the matter of restructuring the line of authority in Air Canada.

Mr. Bell: Is the Prime Minister suggesting he is considering a two president policy, something like the two flag policy of the Liberal government?
