ing the medical effects of the use of marijuana and, if so, when will he be in a position to inform the House of the findings?

Hon. John C. Munro (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Yes, Mr. Speaker. Money is available to various scientists in Canada for study and research having to do with the effects of marijuana on humans. Some experiments are going on, first, with a view to ascertaining its effect on animals, and the findings will then be related to the study affecting humans. I do not know precisely when the results will be made public.

I should like to point out that the commission inquiring into the non-medical use of drugs has money available to it for similar studies. As the hon, member may know, it is expected to make an interim report some time in January and a final report about a year and a half later.

## ECONOMIC COUNCIL

REDUCTION OF PERMANENT SECRETARIAT, EMPLOYMENT OF OUTSIDE CONSULTANTS

Mr. Heath Macquarrie (Hillsborough): I should like to direct a question to the President of the Treasury Board, Mr. Speaker. Has the Economic Council of Canada been asked to reduce its permanent secretariat and to refrain from entering into contracts with outside consultants?

Hon. C. M. Drury (President of the Treasury Board): The Economic Council, like other departments and agencies of the government, has been given a budget for the next fiscal year. In some instances this will result in a reduction of staff; in some instances it will result in changes in programs, and in other instances it will involve changes in the practice of hiring consultants. The determination of which of these courses of action is to be followed is left largely to the agency.

Mr. Macquarrie: May I ask whether this important body has made representations to the effect that its work might be inhibited and proscribed by these respective suggestions?

Mr. Drury: Yes, Mr. Speaker, such representations have been made and given Works): Yes, Mr. Speaker, I think that assurconsideration.

NATIONAL DEFENCE COMPLEX—ASSURANCE RESPECTING ESCALATION OF COST
