POSSIBLE NATIONAL STRIKE-PRESENT POSI-TION OF NEGOTIATIONS-REPORTED INTEN-TION OF MEDIATOR TO WITHDRAW

Mr. David Orlikow (Winnipeg North): I wish to direct my question to the President of the Treasury Board. In view of reports that Dean Carrothers will be announcing today that he can play no useful role as mediator in the postal dispute because the two parties are so far apart that there is at present no hope of reaching an agreement, would the minister tell the House what the government's position on this matter is at the present time?

Hon. C. M. Drury (President of the Treasury Board): Mr. Speaker, Dean Carrothers has invited both sides in this dispute to a meeting starting at 2 p.m., at which time his views will be expressed to them. I do not know what the outcome of this meeting will be and I think it would be unwise to try to second-guess him.

Mr. Orlikow: I should like to ask the President of the Treasury Board whether it is true Mr. Speaker, I thank the leader of the New [Mr. Speaker.]

that the only offer made to the postal employees by the government during the meetings with Dean Carrothers was an increase of 60 cents per month per employee for the life of the contract over the government's offer made during the conciliation proceedings?

Mr. Drury: Mr. Speaker, I think the House is aware of the request of Dean Carrothers that during the currency of his mediation there should not be any public comment on the negotiations.

Mr. Orlikow: On a point of order, Mr. Speaker, in view of the fact that Dean Carrothers is meeting with both parties at the present time and it has been announced that he will say he can serve no function, surely the government should tell the people of Canada what it proposes to do in this extremely serious situation.

Hon. George Hees (Prince Edward-Hastings): Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a supplementary question to the Minister. As the actual words used by Dean Carrothers-I heard them on the one o'clock broadcast and I am sure the minister did too-were to the effect that neither the Treasury Board nor the Postal Union had moved far enough or fast enough to give any indication that a satisfactory conclusion could be arrived at, is it the intention of the Treasury Board to set an example by moving considerably farther and considerably faster than it has seen fit to do so far?

Mr. Drury: Mr. Speaker, that is a suggestion as to how the negotiations should be conducted. I will take it under advisement.
