Mrs. Maheu: Spit it out, Bernie.

Mr. Valcourt: Whenever the lady who is yelling over there buys a tube of lipstick, if she wears lipstick, there is no federal sales tax on it. Is there? Is there a federal sales tax on lipstick? Tell me. I don't wear any. I am going to tell her one thing, that when she and all ladies of Canada buy lipstick they pay 22 cents for the hidden manufacturers' sales tax.
