Junior High School movement in the United States, that they shall be differently trained teachers.

DEAN HENDEL: So there would not be question of some schools taking on part of the Junior High School work? DR. PERCIVAL: It does mean that, that is, as I know the 6-6-3 plan in the States, and I endorse, to a large extent, that principle that there is there; that is to say, with regard to its principle, not with regard to our system of 6-3-3.

THE PRINCIPAL: There is one questions Dr. Percival, and it is this: Conceding the difficulties here of applying this recommendation, do you think, on the whole, the general substance of these conclusions and recommendations **means dimension** of the Survey

Committee are desirable? it is not an absolutely

DR. PERCIVAL: Well, that is a specific question, but the answer would be that these conclusions and recommendations are valid anyway, just as much as they are in Quebec.

THE PRINCIPAL: So that, on the whole, will represent something towards which it would be desirable for the Protestant Education to proceed on?
